[Male 1] As information and insight providers here at the AIHW,
we are really an integral part of Australia's health and welfare system.

We also have like a very large impact on decision making
and a lot of influence on policy as well.

and I've attended things like leadership, time management, media training
and statistical programming courses over the years,
and I've also had the support of the Institute to do further study.

I still get a buzz out of working with such a highly educated and enthusiastic group of
people.

[Female 2] We've got a lot of training here like the training in SAS and the training in
writing.

They add value to my personal professional skills.

[Female 3] Yeah, it's been great to see the work published, and in the media as well.
It's something you're not used to seeing, especially coming from uni.

[Female 4] As an Indigenous person, I enjoy working in this organisation because it's involved in programs that directly impact on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.
People are very friendly and very welcoming,
and I've found the whole induction process has been really good for me.

[Female 1] It's really helpful to be able to rearrange my hours to fit in with important functions for my kids,
and to look after them when they're sick.

[Beautiful physical location ... Access to free parking]

[Male 2] It's a really good opportunity to socialise with others.
Generally, the atmosphere is a little more relaxed,
more conducive to a work/life balance.

[Male 1] Another good thing about the Institute here which I find really impressive is our independence.
We do have such an important impact on policy decisions but we are separate from the Department.

So, I think that really helps our reputation out there in the community as well,
and again might be why we are covered so widely in the media.

It seems that whenever we get our work out there there's the press that just wants to knock down our door to actually cover it as well.
And that's something that we can all be really proud of I think.
