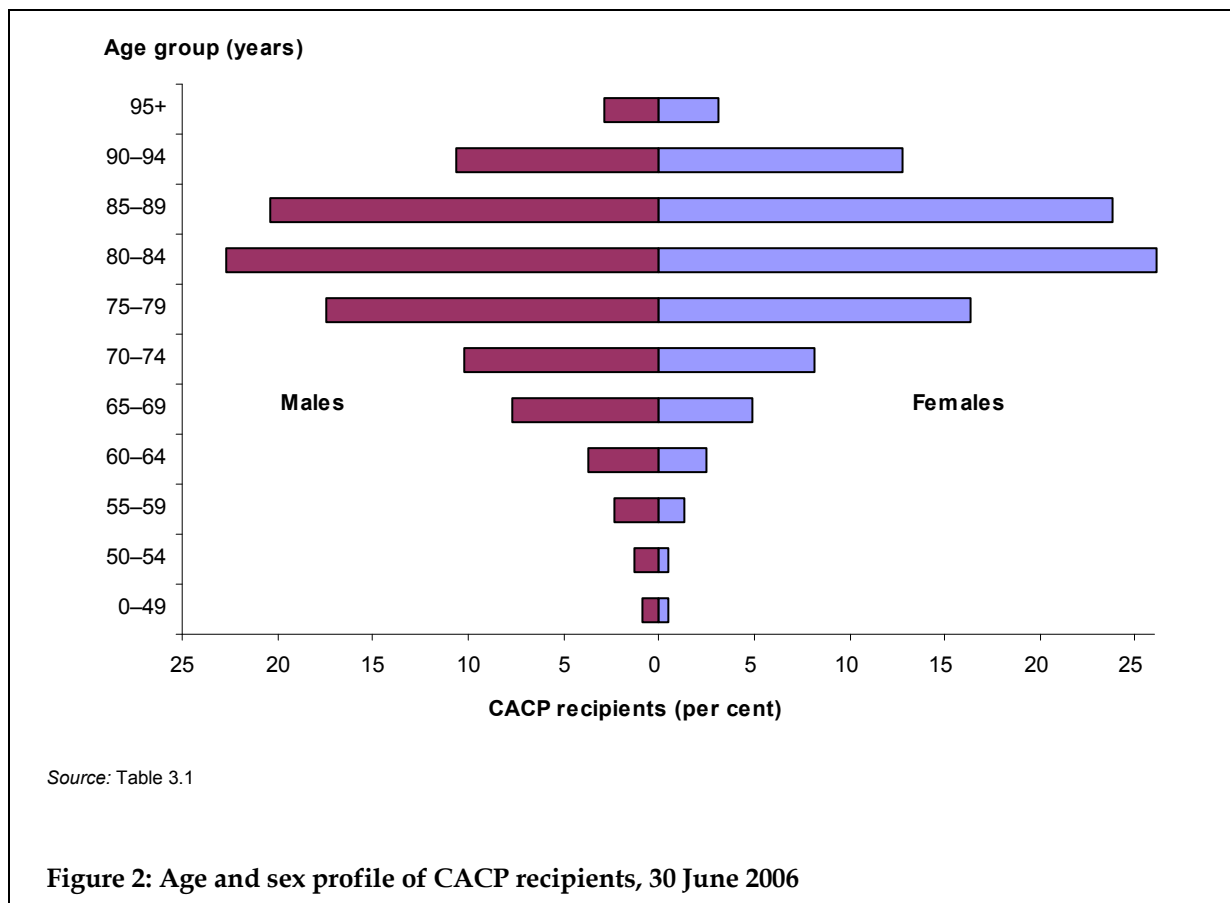


3 CACP recipients

3.1 Age and sex distribution

The majority of the 31,803 CACP recipients at 30 June 2006 were aged 80 years and over (63%) compared with 59% at 30 June 2000. Those aged 90 years and over accounted for 15% of package recipients (Table 3.1). Female recipients predominated in absolute numbers, with 22,662 female recipients and 9,141 male recipients (Table 3.1). Female recipients at 30 June 2006 accounted for 59% of recipients aged under 50 years and 74% of recipients aged 85 years and over. Female recipients tended to be older than their male counterparts (Figure 2). Of total clients, 59% were women aged 75 years or over.



When compared with care recipients in the other states and the Australian Capital Territory, recipients in the Northern Territory had the youngest age profile, with only 60% over the age of 70 years (Table 3.1). The 'oldest' profile was found in Tasmania where care recipients aged 70 years and over made up 93% compared with the national average of 89%.

Over the last 6 years, the proportion of care recipients aged 70 to 79 has decreased from 29% to 25% while the proportion 80 years or older has increased from 59% to 63% of care recipients. However, in the individual age groups, the strongest growth was in those aged

90 years or older from 12% to 15%, and the largest decrease in the 70 to 74 year age group (from 11% to 9%). The 80 to 84 year age group was the largest 5 year age group in each year of this period with nearly 8,000 care recipients (25% in 2006) (Appendix Table A1).

3.2 Younger care recipients (aged under 65 years)

The CACP program targets older people in the community who have complex care needs. Younger people with disabilities can receive packages only if their care needs fit the criteria of the program and if there are no other appropriate services operating in their area (DoHA 2004). Consequently, it is not common for younger people with disabilities to access the program—just under 6% of care recipients were aged under 65 years, and under 1% of care recipients were under the age of 50 years (Table 3.1). A higher proportion of male recipients were under the age of 65 years (8%) compared with females (5%), although in absolute numbers, females outnumbered male clients among younger clients (1,087 females compared with 744 males) (Figure 2 and Table 3.1). Of younger care recipients, 24%¹ identified as Indigenous Australians, a group who often need to access aged care services at younger ages than the rest of the population (see Table 3.10).

3.3 Birthplace and preferred language

Birthplace and preferred language were recorded for almost all CACP recipients. Of those recipients who reported their birthplace, about 3 in 10 were born overseas (31%). Clients born in the United Kingdom and Ireland accounted for 9% of care recipients. Approximately 3% were born in North/West Europe, while 11% were born in South/East Europe. People born in Asia accounted for 4% of care recipients (Table 3.4).

The composition of care recipients by country of birth also varied among states and territories (Table 3.4). Excluding recipients who did not respond to this item, in Western Australia, people born overseas made up 41% of care recipients and in the Australian Capital Territory this proportion was 39%, whereas only 13% and 26% of recipients from the Northern Territory and Tasmania, respectively, were overseas-born. In most states and territories, the majority of overseas-born care recipients were from either South/East European countries or the United Kingdom and Ireland. In Tasmania, most overseas-born care recipients were from North/West Europe and the United Kingdom. The proportion of care recipients from North/West Europe has increased from 4.7% at 30 June 2004 to 6.0% at 30 June 2006, while the proportion of care recipients from South/East Europe has decreased from 6.7% to 5.5% over the same period.

Nationally, 84% of all responding care recipients indicated that English was their preferred language, and 12% preferred another European language. Australian Indigenous languages accounted for just over 1% of preferred languages of all respondents (Table 3.5).

3.4 Usual residence status

Of the 30,591 care recipients who reported their usual residence status at the time of application for a CACP, the majority were home owners or purchasers (64%). Care recipients who lived in public rental housing made up 13% and those who lived in a private rental property or were boarding or lodging accounted for 7% (Table 3.6).

The Northern Territory stood out from the other states and territories, with 43% of all responding care recipients indicating public rental housing as their usual residence compared with the next highest which was the Australian Capital Territory at 19%. Care should be taken when interpreting these figures, however, given the small number of care recipients in both territories.

3.5 Living arrangements

The question that care recipients were asked in relation to their living arrangements at the time of application for a package was: 'With whom do you normally live?' Of those for whom a response was recorded, a large proportion of care recipients reported normally living alone (54%) or with family 41% (Table 3.7).

3.6 'Special needs' groups

There are particular groups of older Australians who are more likely to be disadvantaged in accessing aged care services compared with older Australians in general. These groups are defined by the *Aged Care Act 1997* as 'special needs' groups, which include those who live in rural or remote areas, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, people with personal financial hardship, and veterans. One of the government's objectives is for aged care services to specifically target the needs of these groups of people in order for them to have equitable access to the program.

Indigenous care recipients

In total, there were 1,204 care recipients who were identified as Indigenous Australians at 30 June 2006, making up 3.8% of identified recipients. There were 134 (0.4%) care recipients whose Indigenous status was unknown or not stated.

In the Northern Territory, 65% of care recipients recorded that they were Indigenous. Western Australia had the next highest proportion at 6%. The proportions reported in other jurisdictions ranged from 1.2% in Victoria to 4.1% in the Australian Capital Territory (Table 3.8).

As shown in Table 3.9, remote and very remote areas of Australia were home to a high proportion (42%) of the Indigenous care recipients at 30 June 2006. A further 22% lived in outer regional areas. The remaining Indigenous care recipients lived in major cities (15%) and inner regional areas (22%).

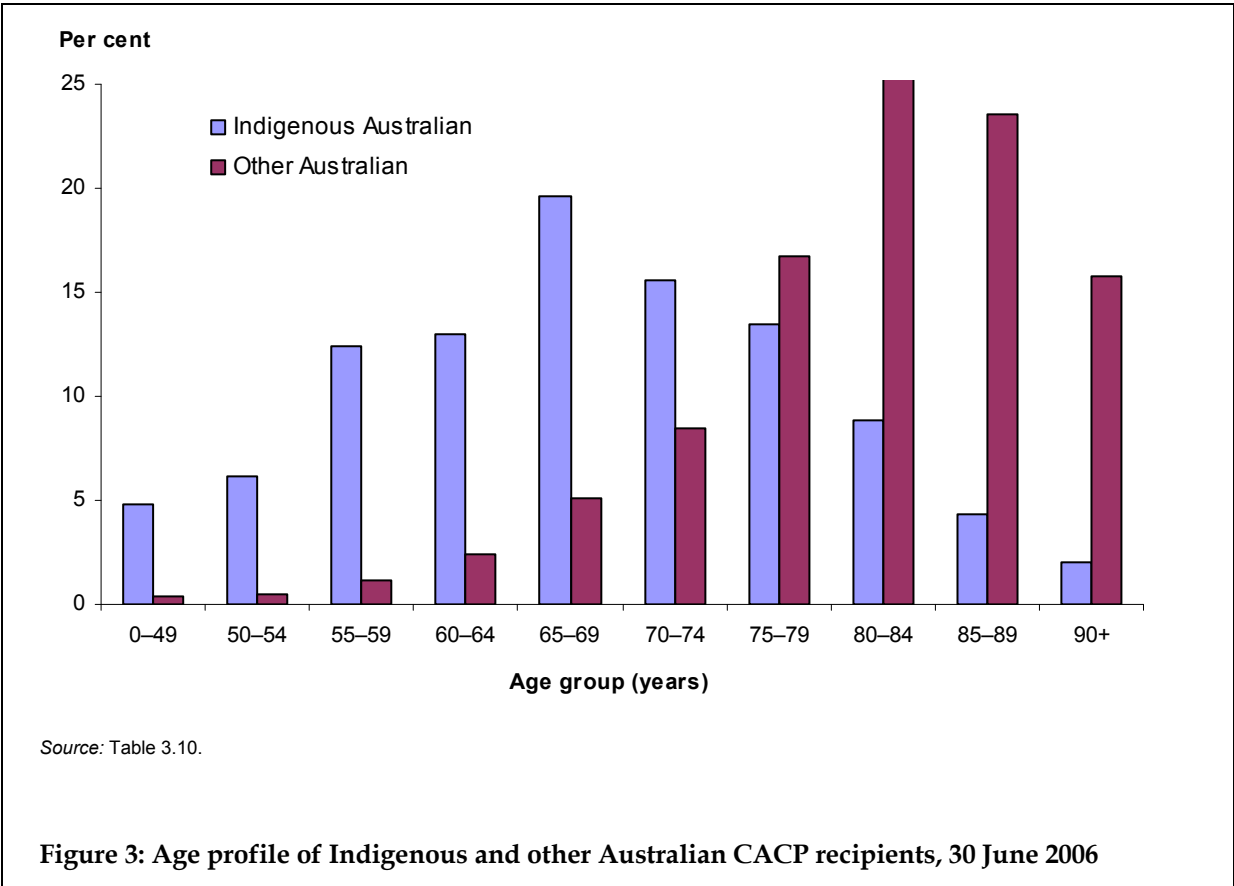
There were 248 packages provided to Indigenous care recipients by services receiving flexible funding under the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Aged Care Strategy. No further data are available on the characteristics of care recipients receiving packages under

the strategy. It is probable that a significant proportion of the 308 packages available from Multi-purpose Services were also used by Indigenous clients. However, further detail is not available for this report.

The age profile of this subgroup of care recipients is considerably younger than that of the general population of care recipients (Figure 3), with 5% aged under 50 years, 51% aged between 50 and 69 years, and 44% aged 70 years and over (compared with less than 1%, 9% and 90%, respectively, for other Australian care recipients) (Table 3.10).

Using the ABS Indigenous population projections (ABS 2004), the ratio of Indigenous people receiving CACPs, including those receiving packages under the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Aged Care Strategy, was 25.1 per 1,000 Indigenous persons aged 50 years and over at 30 June 2006.

Age-specific usage rates are an important element in understanding service use by Indigenous recipients. Table 3.11 shows usage rates for Indigenous care recipients by age and sex. At 30 June 2006, the rate of Indigenous Australians receiving packages was 38.4 per 1,000 Indigenous persons aged 65–69 years, 48.3 per 1,000 aged 70–74 years, and 84.4 per 1,000 persons aged 75 years and over. The comparable figures for other Australians were 2.0, 4.1 and 19.1 per 1,000, respectively.



Care recipients from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds

For the purposes of this report, people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds are defined as those who were born in countries other than Australia, Ireland, the United Kingdom, New Zealand, the United States of America, Canada and South Africa. Overall, there were 6,993 care recipients from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds receiving packages at 30 June 2006, accounting for 22% of care recipients (Table 3.12).

Based on AIHW projections of ABS estimated resident population by country of birth, the number of Australian-born people receiving permanent care at 30 June 2006 was estimated to be 12.6 per 1,000 persons aged 75–84 years and 33.8 per 1,000 aged 85 years and over. The corresponding rates for English-speaking people who were born overseas were 11.7 and 35.8, respectively, whereas the corresponding rates for overseas-born people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds were 18.8 and 45.8 per 1,000 persons (Table 3.13).

Care recipients in financial hardship

For the purposes of the CACP program, a person with financial hardship is defined as someone 'who did not own a home in the 2 years before the reference time; and at the reference time was in receipt of the maximum basic rate of pension or benefit' (DoHA 2004). The program requires service providers to allocate a proportion of packages to people in financial hardship. The specified proportion of allocations varies from region to region depending mainly on the existing service provision levels in the region where the outlet is located. Outlets providing housing-linked packages are specifically obliged to reserve all their packages for care recipients in financial hardship. Housing-linked packages have the same eligibility criteria as general care packages. They are aimed at people with financial hardship living in designated rental housing developments. These could range from congregate settings with high concentrations of aged people (such as boarding houses) to detached public housing spread across a particular suburb.

At 30 June 2006, 1,011 outlets were providing CACPs throughout Australia. Almost all (98%) were required to allocate at least 10% of their total packages to care recipients in financial hardship, with the majority (79%) having a target set between 11% and 30% (Table 3.14). There were 78 outlets with a requirement to provide more than 90% of their care packages to care recipients in financial hardship. The Northern Territory was the most exceptional case with 15% of the outlets having a target of more than 90% and 31% with a target of more than 80%. This reflects the higher proportion of people identified as being in financial hardship in the Northern Territory. Victoria had a high proportion of outlets with a target in excess of 90% (14%), but had no outlets with a target between 81% and 90%. Of outlets in New South Wales, 9% had a target of more than 80%. In addition, outlets in remote and very remote regions were more likely than others to have targets of 80% or more for recipients in financial hardship (Table 3.15).

Overall, 9,161 (26%) packages were allocated for financial hardship (Table 3.17), with the Northern Territory also having the highest proportion of such packages (68%) which was at least twice the proportion for any other state or territory.

The proportion of care recipients identified as being in financial hardship for each state and territory is presented in Table 3.16, and for each remoteness category in Table 3.18. These

figures should be treated with great caution as financial hardship status was not reported for 28% of mainstream care recipients, with non-response rates varying considerably across jurisdictions. Of those for whom financial hardship status was reported, 35% were in financial hardship and 65% were not. The high levels of missing data for this characteristic preclude further analysis of access by people in financial hardship.

The Community Aged Care Packages Census 2002 (AIHW 2004a) provides analysis of such access in this area where the level of missing data is much lower.

Care recipients in outer regional and remote areas

As shown in Table 3.2, there were 3,733 CACP recipients who lived in outer regional, remote and very remote areas of Australia. This number accounted for 12% of all care recipients at 30 June 2006 (9% in outer regional areas and 3% in remote and very remote areas) (Table 3.3). The age profile for care recipients in these regions is younger than for care recipients in major cities and inner regional areas, with 22% of care recipients in outer regional, remote and very remote areas under the age of 70 years (compared with 9% and 13% of care recipients aged less than 70 years in major cities and inner regional areas, respectively). This difference in the age profile is more marked when care recipients in very remote areas are viewed separately, among whom care recipients under the age of 70 years accounted for approximately 44% of recipients. This age profile of care recipients in remote and very remote areas is likely to be influenced by the younger age profile of Indigenous care recipients, who made up 35% of care recipients in remote areas and 72% of recipients in very remote areas (Table 3.9).

3.7 Admissions and separations

There were 16,861 admissions to a CACP between 1 July 2005 and 30 June 2006. During the same period there were 13,957 separations from packages (Tables 3.19 and 3.20).

The majority of admissions (82%) were for people aged 75 years or over, and more than two-thirds of admissions were for females, with 31% of admissions being for males.

Among those who stopped receiving assistance from a CACP provider between 1 July 2005 and 30 June 2006, the main reasons reported were that care recipients either left to go to a residential aged care service (48%) or died (18%). A small proportion of care recipients left to be admitted to a hospital (5%) or to move to another CACP service provider (6%) (Table 3.20).

This pattern of completed care episodes is consistent across most states and territories. However, the Northern Territory is an exception, with a lower proportion moving to a residential aged care service (27% of separations compared with 48% nationally) and a higher proportion of deaths (34% compared with 18% nationally). The Northern Territory also had a higher percentage moving to another CACP provider. Care must be taken in interpreting results for the Northern Territory, however, given the small number of separations involved (149).

The proportion of men who left to go to a residential aged care service was somewhat lower (44% of separations involving men) than that for women (51%). Conversely, there were a higher proportion of deaths among men (24%) than among women (16%).

For separations from 1 July 2005 to 30 June 2006, 17% received care for less than 3 months from a service provider before leaving, 32% for 3 months to a year, 21% between 1 and 2 years, and 20% between 2 and 4 years (Table 3.21). The number of care recipients who received care for more than 4 years from the same service outlet accounted for 11%, compared with 9% in the previous year, and 7% in 2003–04. In 2005–06, the maximum length of care from a service provider before leaving was just over 11 years (ranging from 8.5 years in the Australian Capital Territory to 11.4 years in Queensland (AIHW, unpublished data).

The relationship between length of stay and reasons for separations was also examined (Table 3.22). There does not seem to be a strong correlation between length of stay and reason for separation; however, very short stay (less than 4 weeks) care recipients were less likely to leave a package and enter residential care than longer stay care recipients, and care recipients with a longer length of stay were more likely to have died. Care recipients whose reason for leaving was recorded as 'Other' were more likely to have stayed for less than 3 months (28%) than other care recipients (15%).
