# Explanatory notes in respect of the national nursing labour force survey

#### **Background**

In 1990, the Australian Health Ministers' Advisory Council (AHMAC) commissioned the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare to develop national health labour force statistics about the major registrable health professions. Data collections based on a national minimum data set were developed addressing the labour force planning needs of the health professions, government, service providers and educational institutions. In addition to nursing, published data from the collection are available for medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, podiatry, optometry and physiotherapy.

In 1997, the National Health Information Management Group of AHMAC reviewed national health labour information requirements and decided that future national collections would be conducted annually for medicine, biennially for nursing, and on a rolling three-year cycle for dentistry and several allied health occupations. The first biennial collection for nursing was conducted in 1997 and the second in 1999.

#### Scope and coverage

The scope of the national nursing labour force survey, which is conducted in association with renewal of registration and enrolment, is all nurses registered or enrolled with the nurses' board or nursing council in each State and Territory, and eligible to practise.

The coverage may exclude nurses who registered for the first time during the current year. These nurses may not be required to renew their registration at the standard renewal date if the initial registration in that State or Territory has occurred during the preceding 12 months.

#### Method

The labour force data in this publication were obtained from a nursing labour force survey conducted by each State and Territory nurses board on behalf of the Institute. Each State and Territory nurses board conducts an annual renewal of registrations and a survey questionnaire was sent to all nurses as part of the registration renewal process. Each State and Territory health authority forwarded a computer file of the survey data to the Institute for aggregation into a national data set.

#### Nurse labour force survey response rate

The overall response rate can only be estimated, because it is known that at least some nurses who were registered in more than one State or Territory completed a questionnaire in just one State or Territory. The incidence of this occurrence cannot be ascertained because matching survey records among States and Territories is not possible.

Based on the total of the registrations in each State and Territory, the estimated response rate to the survey was 79%. The response rate was 83% in New South Wales, 77% in Victoria, 92% in Queensland, 73% in Western Australia, 59% in South Australia, 72% in Tasmania, 36% in the Australian Capital Territory and 70% in the Northern Territory. However, complete data were not available for all responding nurses, either because not

all survey questions were completed or because nurses board initial registration data were incomplete or not provided.

#### Collection timing

The labour force survey is conducted by the nurses' registration board in each State and Territory in conjunction with the annual renewal of practice licences. Therefore, the timing of the survey depends on the licence renewal procedure that operates in each State and Territory.

In this publication, survey data collected during 1997 were used, except for the Australian Capital Territory. As the survey was not conducted in the Australian Capital Territory in 1997, the 1998 survey data have been scaled to 1997 registration numbers.

#### Identification of registered and enrolled nurses

The 1997 survey questionnaire did not have a question that identified whether a nurse was on the register or the roll in each State and Territory because it was assumed that this would be readily available from the registering authority.

A means of positively identifying whether a respondent to the survey was on the register or the roll was provided for New South Wales, Queensland, Western Australia, Tasmania and the Northern Territory. For all other States and Territories, nurses were identified as registered or enrolled by the division in which they were registered (see table below). Nurses identified as being both registered and enrolled were defined as registered in the survey database.

# **Main features**

This publication presents statistics on the numbers of registered and enrolled nurses from 1993 to 1999, and preliminary results from the 1997 nursing labour force survey. It includes data on the labour force status and occupation of registered and enrolled nurses in 1997, on nurses employed in private and public hospitals from 1994–95 to 1998–99, key statistics on nurse education and migration, and information on nurse occupations identified as being in shortage by the Department of Employment, Workplace Relations and Small Business (DEWRSB).

#### The main features include:

- The total numbers of nurse registrations and enrolments increased slightly in 1999, from 264,608 in 1998 to 265,983, but remain below the levels of 1995 and earlier (Table 1).
- The number of enrolments declined by 23% between 1993 and 1999, from 68,625 to 53,103. In the same period, the number of nurse registrations increased by only 0.1%, from 212,630 to 212,878, after dropping to a low of 207,038 in 1996 (Table 1).
- In 1999, total nurse employment was estimated to be 221,988, similar to the previous four years (Table 2; source: AIHW).
- In 1999, the average quarterly employment of nurses in clinical care was 195,900, with 44.1% employed part-time (Table 3; source: ABS).
- The number of full-time equivalent (FTE) nurses employed in public acute and psychiatric hospitals declined by 2.8% between 1995–96 and 1998–99, while the number of patient separations increased by 7.4% during the same period (Table 7). In private acute and psychiatric hospitals during this time, the number of FTE nurses employed increased by 11.0%, while the number of patient separations increased by 16.0% (Table 8).
- In recent years there has been a small steady increase in registration board and employment numbers in the two Territories and in New South Wales, Queensland, Western Australia and South Australia. However, in Victoria, nurse registrations and enrolments fell from 70,554 in 1998 to 68,923 in 1999, while in Tasmania there was a reduction in these numbers from 6,316 in 1998 to 5,863 in 1999. Employment levels per 100,000 population in both States are now only just above the national average of 1,033, whereas a decade earlier they were well above the then national average of 1,171 per 100,000 population (Table 3).
- Between 1997 and 1998, the number of Australian permanent residents completing basic nursing courses declined by 2.2%, from 4,765 to 4,661. The number completing post-basic courses declined by 12.3%, from 4,591 to 4,026 (Table 11). The number of Australian permanent residents commencing basic nursing courses increased by 7.1% from 1997 to 1998, then remained static at 7,388 in 1999. The number commencing post-basic courses declined by 7.4% between 1998 and 1999, from 4,608 to 4,267 (Table 10).
- In 1998–99, 1,080 nurses migrated permanently to Australia and 661 Australian nurses migrated permanently to other countries. During the same period, 450 overseas nurses arrived in Australia for temporary employment, a sharp increase on 276 in 1997–98 (Tables 12–15).

 According to DEWRSB, in December 1999 there were shortages in several nursing occupations for all States and Territories. These included operating theatre and critical/intensive care registered nurses in all States and Territories, and accident/emergency, aged care, mental health, midwifery and general registered nurses in most States and Territories.

More detailed nursing labour force survey, education and immigration statistics will be published in *Nursing Labour Force* 1999 later this year.

### **Glossary**

#### Country

The Australian Bureau of Statistics, *Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics*, Catalogue No. 1269.0 has been used to classify country of initial qualification and country of birth into the following categories:

- 1. Australia
- 2. New Zealand
- 3. United Kingdom and Ireland: England, Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland, Ireland
- 4. Asia: Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Viet Nam, People's Republic of China, Hong Kong, Japan, Democratic People's Republic of Korea (North Korea), Republic of Korea (South Korea), Macau, Mongolia, Formosa, Taiwan, Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan, Sri Lanka
- 5. *Other countries:* all countries not specified above.

#### **Enrolled nurse**

A nurse who is on the roll maintained by the State or Territory nurses board or nursing council to practise nursing in that State or Territory. The minimum educational requirement for an enrolled nurse is a one year diploma from a tertiary education institution or equivalent from a recognised hospital based program. It is necessary for a nurse to have practised for a specified minimum period in the past five years to maintain enrolment. Enrolled nurses include mothercraft and dental nurses where the educational course requirements may be greater than one year but less than a three year degree course or equivalent.

#### **Nursing labour force**

The nursing labour force (registered and enrolled nurses) in each State and Territory includes nurses currently employed in nursing and nurses who are not employed in nursing but are looking for work in nursing.

Registered and enrolled nurses who, at the time of the survey, were on maternity or other extended leave for more than three months are employed, and thus form part of the nursing labour force. However, in most tables for employed nurses, those on extended leave have not been included because not all States and Territories collected data on their employment characteristics prior to commencement of leave.

#### Occupation

A description of the job function within the field of nursing of a person with nursing qualifications. The occupations are:

- *clinician*: a registered or enrolled nurse who is mainly involved in the care and treatment of patients, including nursing diagnosis and preventative action;
- clinical nurse manager: a person mainly employed in managing nurse clinicians;
- *administrator*: a person mainly employed in nursing administration;

- *teacher/educator:* a person who is teaching or training persons in nursing for their initial qualification or in advanced skills after initial qualification;
- researcher: a person engaged in nursing research; and
- *other:* a job function in nursing which is not one of the above—for example, industrial relations or public health activities in nursing.

#### Registered nurse

A nurse who is on the register maintained by the State or Territory nurses board or nursing council to practise nursing in that State or Territory. The minimum educational requirement for a registered nurse is a three year degree from a tertiary education institution or equivalent from a recognised hospital-based program. Registered nurses may have their practice certificate endorsed to practise in a specific clinical area (for example, midwifery) on completion of a recognised postgraduate course. To maintain registration, it is necessary for a nurse to have practised for a specified minimum period in the field of nursing in the past five years.
