Foreword

The Australian Institute of Health and Welfare is pleased to produce this second version of the National Classifications of Community Services, which is designed to assist in the collection of quality data that is nationally consistent across community services.

Version 2 of the classifications was funded by the Community Services Ministers' Advisory Council and produced under the direction of the National Community Services Information Management Group. This version has been refined and enhanced following a consultative process undertaken by the National Community Services Data Committee. All Australian community services departments, the Australian Bureau of Statistics, the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare and representatives from non-government community services organisations have cooperated in the development and production of these classifications.

The revised classifications are comprised of two parts: service activities and service delivery settings. The changes make this a more relevant document for the activities that community services provide. They also provide for the collection of more accurate information than previously possible.

Progress was made in the area of cross-classifying national data sets such as those emerging from the Commonwealth State Territory Disability Agreement, the Supported Accommodation Assistance Program, and Home and Community Care program with the national classification name and code. These classifications have been alphabetically indexed.

This work is still in progress and the users of these classifications are invited to contribute to future versions.

1 Introduction

The primary objective of this publication is to provide a basis for consistent classification, across a diverse range of service types, of the delivery of community services in terms of the activities provided to clients, and the setting in which such services are delivered. The classifications have been designed to provide a stable national framework that is consistent with the reporting needs of service providers, jurisdictions and national program managers. Hence they can be used to meet information needs at different levels, as they can be used by an individual service provider as part of their own service/client record-keeping systems, through to meeting requirements for national data collection, analysis and reporting.

The document has been structured to provide clear guidelines for the use of the classifications. It is an improvement on the previous version as it provides more comprehensive coverage of community services activities, and service delivery settings information.

The classifications can be used to describe organisations or specific service delivery events. Furthermore, they can be used to describe the primary activity of an organisation or a service delivery event, or all service activities undertaken by an organisation or during a service delivery event. The way the classifications are applied and the level of detail depend on the data requirements from within and external to community services organisations.

Version 2 of the *National Classifications of Community Services* aims to minimise the amount of data collection required and is constructed so that the finer levels of subdivision of data used administratively can be mapped to the national standard classifications. This is intended to achieve consistency, comparability and economy of effort in developing quality information. Conversely, where classification detail is derived from other national standard classifications it is mappable back to the original.

The classifications can be used in many different ways in community services data collections. For example, they can be used as a basis for collection of data about the numbers of clients receiving particular types of assistance, and how much of this was provided in a residential or community setting. This information can assist in addressing issues such as responsiveness to consumer needs, rationalisation and integration of service delivery mechanisms. The service activity and service delivery setting classifications describe the 'what' and 'where' of community services delivery.

2 Scope of the National classifications of community services

2.1 Coverage

The classifications cover the broad range of community services administered or funded by government community services agencies and/or provided by non-government organisations. The activities classification measures activities in the form of service inputs and throughput. Delivery setting provides additional information about input and throughput. This information may in turn be used to measure outputs or products, however the classifications have not been designed according to outputs or products. The measurement of these would best be made through the use of the Government Purpose Classification and the Central Product Classification.

The activities classification includes virtually all activities classified to the 'Community Services' sub-division in the Australia New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), while some activities classified in ANZSIC to industries other than 'Community Services' are included (for example, aged care homes, accommodation assistance, corrective and employment services).

The classifications exclude acute health care activities, which are classified to the 'Health' subdivision in ANZSIC for example, those activities provided by hospitals, alcohol and drug treatment centres psychiatric institutions and other health care establishments whose primary service activity involves the stabilisation and management of people with acute health care problems together with accommodation.

The classifications include services such as aged care homes and residential palliative care establishments that provide longer term health care in conjunction with accommodation and other types of support such as assistance with day-to-day living tasks and assistance towards independent living.

They also include short-term housing assistance such as crisis and transitional accommodation (for example, assistance by services funded under the Supported Accommodation Assistance Program) and services that assist people to find suitable independent living arrangements. However, they exclude long-term housing assistance such as public housing.

The classifications exclude income support services such as Centrelink pensions, benefits and rental assistance, although they include services that provide financial assistance and relief to people in crisis (for example, emergency relief). The provision of concessions other than those provided through Australia's taxation system is included, for example, concessions provided by State/Territory or local government agencies, however taxation concessions are excluded.

2.2 Describing community services

The NCCS does not intend to describe the full complexity of the provision of community services. It does, however, attempt to classify at a very basic level what government policy is trying to achieve by describing what services are provided, where they are provided and to whom they may be targeted and delivered. For example the Home and Community Care program intends to provide services for 'frail older persons and younger persons with disabilities and their carers living in the community'. This implies that we can identify 'frail', 'older' and 'younger persons', 'people with a disability', 'carers' and persons 'living in the community'. It also implies that we can identify not only the people to whom services are delivered, but also the potential population to whom these services are targeted. Consistency in how these concepts are recorded within the population as a whole (for example, census data and other national surveys) and within and across community services data collections is necessary to provide this very fundamental description of community services.

2.3 Changes from Version 1

This is the second version of the National Classifications of Community Services. This version describes two areas of community services: service activities, and service delivery settings. This publication is an updated and enhanced form of Version 1.

The review leading to this 2002 edition of the NCCS was commissioned by the National Community Services Information Management Group. It was intended to enhance the usefulness of the classifications in providing a consistent basis for national reporting, particularly across different programs and across the different jurisdictions. In addition, the national classifications are constructed within a framework consistent with other relevant national and international classifications.

As a result of the consultative process undertaken prior to the publication of this document some major changes have been made. *The National Classifications of Community Services* Version 1¹ was published by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare in 1997 and comprised classifications of:

- service activities;
- target groups; and
- service delivery settings.

Extensive consultations confirmed that the activities and setting classifications received widespread use, and should be retained in a similar form to Version 1. There was also interest in retaining the target group classification, but users identified a need for some restructuring to eliminate ambiguities that arose in coding. Thus, while the target group classification has been deleted from this version, a

discussion of the relevance of target group to the remaining classifications is included in the introduction.

Another change involved matching the national classifications with data items from some minimum data sets in use in community services. The national classifications that have been matched are Home and Community Care (HACC), Commonwealth–State/Territory Disability Agreement (CSTDA), and Supported Accommodation Assistance Program (SAAP).

In addition to these changes, all the national classification codes have been changed and updated to clearly differentiate between levels of activities undertaken by community services. In order to ease transition from old codes to the new codes explanatory tables are included in each section.

Each of the classifications is complete and can be used independently. In this edition, the service activities classification is covered in Part A; and the service delivery setting is covered in Part B. While each may be used separately, they may also be used in conjunction to provide a more detailed composite description of services and where they were delivered.

As well as structuring the classifications for consistency, the coding frames have been improved by distinguishing each of the classifications with their own codes to produce unique alphanumeric identifiers for each class. The level and coverage of classes is determined by the experience of the intervening years and advice from users of NCCS Version 1.

2.4 Relationships to other classifications

Program-specific data collections

Comparisons of categories used in program-specific data collections for the Commonwealth–State/Territory Disability Agreement National Minimum Data Set (CSTDA NMDS) the Home and Community Care National Minimum Data Set (HACC NMDS), and the Supported Accommodation Assistance Program (SAAP) Data Set are set out in appendixes at the end of the document.

Other classifications

A mapping of the NCCS Version 2 activities classification to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) industry classification the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) appears in <u>Appendix A5</u>.

Note that each of these classifications has a different conceptual basis. The classification of community services activities seeks to categorise individual service activities, whereas the ABS ANZSIC seeks to identify groupings of businesses whose predominant activity (measured in terms of output or employment) is similar.

This classification of community services activities includes virtually all activities classified to the 'Community Services' sub division in ANZSIC, while some activities

classified in ANZSIC to industries other than 'Community Services' are included in NCCS Version 2 (for example, aged care homes).

A correspondence between the NCCS Version 2 activities classification and the provisional Central Product Classification (CPC) and the Government Purpose Classification (GPC) is set out in <u>Appendix A6</u>.

The National Classifications of Community Services are designed to more clearly define community services activities, but they are not designed to measure the purpose or product of community services delivery. The purpose or product should be classified using the provisional CPC and/or the GPC.

It should be noted that a number of categories in the NCCS Version 2 activities classification are mappable to different areas of the GPC. For example, because counselling activities may be provided in a number of different community services program delivery contexts such as family support, vocational rehabilitation and employment, aged care counselling can be classified to different areas of the GPC. There are fifteen major groups in the GPC. The major groups that correspond with the NCCS Version 2 are public order and safety, education, health, social security and welfare, and housing and community amenities.

Integration issues

The above comparisons of national standards will assist in the ongoing process of facilitating national and cross-program consistency in classification and data reporting.

It is envisaged that future editions will move to integrate classifications for all community-based services, whether welfare, housing or health.

National Community Services Data Dictionary Version 2 (NCSDD)

The National Classifications of Community Services have important links with the NCSDD Version 2.

The NCCS Version 2 provides the data domains for the following data elements in NCSDD:

Service activity: NCSDD Version 2, pp. 184–5. ID=000538 (Assistance type); pp. 172–3, ID=00601 (Assistance type received); and pp. 123–4, ID=000603 (Service types available).

Target group: NCSDD Version 2, p. 151, ID=000537.

Service delivery setting: NCSDD Version 2, p.135–6. ID=000539.

The NCSDD contains many data elements that describe various attributes used in the NCCS Version 1 target group classification, such as demographic information and tenure.

3 The classifications

3.1 Rationale for the structure of the classifications

Each classification has a hierarchical structure which at its broadest level specifies broad groupings that are readily identifiable or that people usually identify with, and at its finest level enables coding of specific instances. Hence the following structure:

Section > Group > Class > subclass >[sub-subclass]>>>>[individual case]

In terms of the classifications in this publication, the finest subdivision is termed a *class*. Finer subdivisions may be necessary or appropriate for local or agency use. While these will represent local data needs, it is important for aggregate reporting that subclasses are mappable to the class level of the national classification.

There are some differences in the construction of the different classifications, because of differences in the underlying concepts. The classification of service delivery settings (Part B) follows a simple hierarchical model quite closely. The classification of service activities is explained in detail in Part A of the classifications.

3.2 The concept of service

The expected result of using a set of national classifications of community services is to facilitate the collection of information on services provided. The provision of services is the process taken to utilise resources to respond to a *need*. It is what happens between assigning resources for community services and the resources being consumed.

Thus,

Service

A process of assistance in response to a need.

² This requires some qualification, because it is normal practice in community services to include the value of goods as well as services when the assistance includes the provision of financial or material support.




Figure 1: Service – a process of assistance in response to a need

The process that constitutes a *service* can be visualised as going from provider to recipient in a context dependent on characteristics of both (Figure 1).

Figure 1 shows the process of providing assistance in response to a need. The client experiences an episode or episodes of need that can be assisted by a particular community services organisation. A provider (or providers) develops an activity or series of activities in response to the need for assistance initiated by the client or clients while operating within the context of its objectives. The client presents to the appropriate agency/organisation in order to obtain assistance. The service provider has a set of criteria that determines the individual's eligibility for assistance. Certain characteristics of the recipient (client) should match those of the target group determined by the provider objectives. These criteria are related to client characteristics and whether or not these characteristics fall within the boundaries of the target group.

Detailed descriptions of target groups can be made utilising the NCSDD Version 2 and applying the particular characteristics in relation to the activity provided. The appropriate service is provided for the client in need according to the organisation's objectives. The physical setting in which the activities of assistance take place will also depend on the nature of both the provider and recipient. Activity and setting are

described in detail in the following classifications, followed by a discussion on target groups.

Attributes of service

Service activity

A service involves a provider undertaking the process of assistance, and a recipient receiving this assistance. The provider undertakes a number of actions whose purpose is to further the process of assistance in response to the need. These actions are *service activities*.

Service activities are components of the process of assistance: activities in the context of services. One or more service activities may be required to provide a service.

Furthermore, it may be possible to break a particular service activity into smaller components. This is the basis of a classification hierarchy to describe types of service activity.

In relation to classifying the attributes of service, it is important to distinguish between the concepts of service and service activity. First, there is some point beyond which it is not necessary or feasible to divide activities into components. Second, it is possible to aggregate basic components into larger pieces of the process of assistance. If we take 'domestic assistance' as an example of a service activity, this could comprise as components activities such as cleaning, ironing, washing, cooking and shopping. Or we may consider the service activity to be 'supporting independent living at home' that would include component activities such as personal assistance, domestic assistance and home maintenance.

Thus we can say that a service activity is part or all of the process of assistance required to provide a service and can make up part or all of the process of assistance for different services without changing type.

A service, in contrast, is described not only by its component activities, but also by its *target group* and usually by the *setting* in which it is delivered.

Service activity
A discrete component of the process of assistance in the context of providing a service.

Application

The principal use of the classification is the **coding** of **primary** activities provided by an individual organisation or service provision location. The classification is not designed for use in the coding of an organisation's ancillary activities. However, the term 'primary activity' should not be considered a catch-all for organisations delivering a variety of services activities (such as Sydney City Mission), nor should it be applied to integrated services (such as Community Aged Care Packages), where each service activity should be coded separately.

A service activity may be an individual action or a group of individual actions. Each activity should be distinguishable from other activities, and should be important enough in terms of client assistance to be separately identified.

A primary activity is a discrete, core activity that addresses a specific need and which seeks to achieve an outcome. For example, the primary activity of Meals on Wheels is the provision of healthy meals that are delivered to the client's home in order to assist in maintaining independence in the home. An organisation may provide more than one primary activity. For example the primary activity of Meals on Wheels is easy to classify as *A01.4.06 Food service*. However other services are also conducted concurrently. The activity of providing companionship is carried out as a component part of the overall service of delivering meals (the primary activity), while fundraising activities may be incidental to or support the primary activity. Such activities are therefore regarded as ancillary to the primary activity. In this example, the fundraising activity should be coded to the primary activity, that is, food services, and not to other classifications. Similarly, general administrative functions associated with the primary activity may also be coded to the primary activity.

For example, the provision of domestic assistance (a primary activity) may entail some incidental provision of information, and also some administration. However, the information provision and administration activities should not be coded as primary activities in their own right, but should be considered part of the primary activity of domestic assistance and coded accordingly. The coding of all activities, primary and ancillary, would not only be laborious but would not yield useful information about how clients are assisted. It may be used to classify service type, that is the main service activity of an individual organisation or location, although it is not specifically designed for this purpose.

The most common use for the classification is to apply it to distinct core types of activity undertaken by an organisation, that is, those that fall within the purpose of an organisation and/or are types of assistance that an organisation is specifically funded to do. Nevertheless, the classification is not based on this usage and can be used to describe any service activity, core or ancillary.

When applied to core assistance, ancillary service activities should be included within the associated core activity. For example, counselling provided as part of the provision of crisis accommodation should be classified as 'crisis accommodation', not under 'information advice and referral'. This usage conforms with that applied in the 1999–2000 Community Services Economic Activity Survey³.

3.3 The concept of setting

The attribute of an agency (an organisational unit or sub-unit) relevant to a particular service is the *setting* in which it is delivered. The physical setting may influence the effectiveness of service delivery. Service delivery setting is defined in the NCSDD Version 2:

Service delivery setting

The type of physical setting in which a service is provided to a client, irrespective of whether or not this is the same as the usual location of the service providing—agency.⁴

Service delivery setting is divided into 4 sections. Section 1, Independent living, community and other settings, is divided into 3 groups. Group 1.1 classifies a number of types of independent living situations such as private dwellings and living informally (living in squats or living rough). Group 1.2 of this section shows the community settings in which these services are provided and Group 1.3 describes electronic settings in which clients receive assistance such as telephone or on the internet.

Section 2, Supported independent living, provides information on the various types of supported accommodation settings where a provider supports the client to live independently in accommodation owned by the provider.

Section 3, Residential care, describes the settings where services are provided to those in need of higher levels of support. This includes residential settings where the client no longer lives in a household environment.

Section 4, Commercial, industrial or other settings, classifies settings where community services are provided to people in a commercial or industrial setting. It is closer in nature to Section 1 than Sections 2 and 3.

Application

The principal use of the classification is the **coding** of settings in which organisations provide services. A service delivery setting may be a private home, a park or a telephone, wherever the activity is provided to the client.

A service setting is where a core activity that addresses a specific need occurs. For example, the setting of Meals on Wheels is the provision of healthy meals that are delivered to the client's home in order to assist in maintaining independence in the home. In this case the setting for this community service would be one of the classes in *S1.1 Independent living*.

The provision of domestic assistance is conducted in a client's home, so this would be coded as *S1.1.01 Owner/purchaser/renter occupied dwelling*.

Counselling can be provided in many of the settings described in the classifications. The ability to differentiate where the counselling took place is one of the benefits of the settings classifications.

3.4 The concept of target group

Within the context of a service, the intended recipients are those in need of the assistance the service provides and we designate this the target group. The concept of target group depends on matching the objectives of the program or agency that originates the service and the characteristics of individuals or groups. Target group is defined in the NCSDD Version 2 in terms of a group of people with one or more particular characteristics that 'a community services program/service seeks to assist'. This is related to the concept of client, which is a party eligible to receive services directly or indirectly. Hence the concepts of client and target group are linked by the idea of eligibility, and generally clients would be expected to be a subset of the target group. Eligibility itself is a formal recognition of need. Note that specifying a target group requires information about program or agency objectives, and these must be matched with the characteristics of those in need of the assistance that is intended to fulfil those objectives.

Target group

Groups of people with a characteristic or set of characteristics that a particular program/service provider seeks to assist.

Target group generally defines intended clients. It may relate to a very broad grouping or to a very discrete grouping. The definition of a target group may be found in the terms of legislation, needs, presenting problems, circumstances, sociodemographic or geographic characteristics. The details of target group may differ from eligibility criteria. Clients of a program may be individuals, families, households, and other groups of people or organisations. For example, while aged care programs are primarily targeted at the aged, they may have additional targeting criteria that seek to ensure equity of service availability for financially or otherwise disadvantaged persons. The main problem with target group classification was that it didn't classify additional targeting criteria, which can be highly specific for individual services. It is not feasible to incorporate all of these characteristics in a single, useable classification.

Preparatory work for Version 2 of the classifications revealed that the target group section had not been widely utilised. Users stated that a major difficulty with Version 1 was that it was possible to classify any one group in more than one way, and that choosing a single class did not always provide a sufficient description. The instructions for applying a target group classification specified that only two or three classifications should be used. When more than two or three classifications could be applied to a target group, the primary characteristics were to be classified in order to reduce the number of classifications.

It has become apparent during consultations that while there is interest in having the capability to classify target group, this is of lesser importance than the capability to

classify service delivery activities and service delivery settings. Furthermore, the measurement of targeting criteria is multifaceted and complex. There are competing requirements for description of targeting details in terms of both community services programs and individual service facilities.

Most government-funded programs have a clearly stated target group, making it difficult to separate the activity from the target group. While it is important to identify target groups, an artificial division was created when target groups were separated from programs.

However, there is a need to recognise the unmet demand and unexpected beneficiaries of particular community services that are not covered in the description of target group when it is associated with programs. This information can be captured through collecting such data using characteristics of clients as they are listed in the NCSDD.

Therefore a decision was taken to remove the 'target group' classification from the NCCS Version 2 and to use the relevant data items from the NCSDD for the purpose of describing target groups.

4 Future development of the classifications

NCSDC welcomes feedback from users about the usefulness of Version 2. There is potential in future editions to extend the coverage more generically to community services. This is apparent when we try to define boundaries, for example, between 'community services' and 'community health' or between short-term, transitional and long-term housing assistance. New ways of providing 'transitional accommodation' blur the distinction between short-term and long-term housing assistance; and the separation between community services and community health differs between jurisdictions, and has some overlap, for example HACC program related services, and alcohol and other drug services all of which may be considered to be within the scope of community services.

The coding of service activities in the section on residential care and supported accommodation is problematic with setting and target group concepts being difficult to separate out. Setting is inherent in provision of residential services and therefore further work needs to clarify and separate these concepts. In addition, the level of care provided is also built in to the classification where it could be argued that it could be better served by using the 'resident classification scale' as an adjunct to the service activity classification, in much the same way that target group can be classified using a variety of data elements from the NCSDD.

There are specific examples of blurred boundaries, for example, the HACC program which covers both health and welfare services; the provision of housing, community services and community health services, often by the same personnel and at the same location in small or remote communities; and the problems in distinguishing community mental health support from disability support for some conditions.

5 Using the classifications to describe community services

The classifications may be used independently, and for a variety of purposes, for example, to describe what could be done, demand for services, types of agencies operating, or options for delivering services. Nevertheless, probably the most valuable use of the classifications is to use them together to describe programs or services in a consistent, comparable way. This can lead to better understanding of what is and can be done, information exchange between agencies to achieve best practice, and opportunities for identifying need and filling gaps in service provision.

This section gives examples of individuals receiving a community service and how the three attributes of service can be coded using the classifications in this publication.

Meals on Wheels

An older woman, aged 87, is living independently in her own home and is receiving Meals on Wheels. A government program designed to assist frail older people funds the agency delivering the service. The activity is the delivery of prepared meals (food services). The setting is the person's own home. The target group through the use of the NCSDD can be described using people characteristics such as age (as shown in Example 1 below). To see if the service recipient belongs to the program's target groups the agency needs to know the age of the service recipient. Other information about target group can be obtained according to the agency requirements.

Guide to use

Purpose

The purpose of the activities classification is to provide a basis for consistent classification of the diverse range of services provided by organisations in the community services sector. The principal areas of use of the activities classification are:

- describing what services are available from individual organisations and their locations (for example, in recording information service directories maintained by individual organisations and/or community services program administrators);
- the recording, collection and provision of information about what types of assistance have been provided to clients (for example, administrative information kept by organisations in program-specific data collections, or in general surveys of the community services sector.)

The national classification of community services activities incorporates categories at **section, group** and **class** level. Its adoption for agency–specific and program reporting use is supported and encouraged by the NCSIMG. Version 1 of the classifications (National Classifications of Community Services Version 1) was published by AIHW in 1997 and included a classification of service activities

Scope

The classification seeks to cover the full range of activities of organisations in the community services sector. It necessarily includes a number of service activities that may also be provided by other sectors, for example, Some accommodation assistance and health service activities are included.

Services in other sectors covered in this edition include:

- residential aged care services and residential palliative care establishments that provide longer term health care in conjunction with accommodation and other types of support;
- support and assistance with day-to-day living tasks and assistance towards independent living;
- short-term housing assistance such as crisis and transitional accommodation, for example, assistance by services funded under the SAAP and
- services that assist people to find suitable independent living arrangements.

Coverage in this edition excludes:

- acute health care services (such as those provided by hospitals, alcohol and drug treatment centres, psychiatric institutions and other health care establishments) whose primary service activity involves the stabilisation and management of people with acute health care problems together with accommodation;
- long-term housing assistance such as public housing;
- income support services such as Centrelink pensions, benefits and rental
 assistance, although it includes services that provide financial assistance and
 relief to people in crisis (for example, emergency relief) concessions other than
 those provided through Australia's taxation system; so, concessions such as those
 on standard charges for transport fares, water and energy, or municipal rates
 provided by State/Territory or local government agencies are included, but
 taxation concessions are excluded.

Application

The principal use of the classification is the **coding** of **primary** activities provided by an individual organisation or service provision location. The classification is not designed for use in the coding of an organisation's ancillary activities.

A service activity may be an individual action or a group of individual actions. Each activity should be distinguishable from other activities, and should be important enough in terms of client assistance to be separately identified.

A primary activity is a discrete, core activity that addresses a specific need and which seeks to achieve an outcome. For example, the primary activity of Meals on Wheels is the provision of healthy meals that are delivered to the client's home in order to assist in maintaining independence in the home. An organisation may provide more than one primary activity. For example, the primary activity of Meals on Wheels is easy to classify as *A01.4.06 Food service*. However, other services are also conducted concurrently. The activity of providing companionship is carried out as a component part of the overall service of delivering meals (the primary activity), while fundraising activities may be incidental to or support the primary activity. Such activities are therefore regarded as ancillary to the primary activity. In this example, the fundraising activity should be coded to the primary activity – food services – and not to other classifications. Similarly, general administrative functions associated with the primary activity may also be coded to the primary activity.

For example, the provision of domestic assistance (a primary activity) may entail some incidental provision of information, and also some administration. However, the information provision and administration activities should not be coded as primary activities in their own right, but should be considered part of the primary activity of domestic assistance and coded accordingly. The coding of all activities primary and ancillary would not only be laborious but would not yield useful information about how clients are assisted. It may be used to classify service type that is, the main service activity of an individual organisation or location, although it is not specifically designed for this purpose.

The most common use for the classification is to apply it to distinct core types of activity undertaken by an organisation, that is, those that fall within the purpose of an organisation and/or are types of assistance that an organisation is specifically funded to do. Nevertheless, the classification is not based on this usage and can be used to describe any service activity, core or ancillary.

When applied to core assistance, ancillary service activities should be included within the associated core activity. For example, counselling provided as part of the provision of crisis accommodation should be classified as 'crisis accommodation', not under 'information advice and referral'. This usage conforms with that applied in the 1999–2000 Community Services Economic Activity Survey⁷.

Structure

The structure of the classification is designed so that each activity is mutually exclusive and exhaustive from all other activities, and can be added together to obtain an exhaustive, unduplicated list of activities. To achieve this, the following classification hierarchy has been adopted.

Classification hierarchy

Section > Group > Class > (sub class)

Any individual activity record can only be classified in one way, and every individual record can be assigned and accounted for (most coding frameworks include a 'not elsewhere classified' category to allow for this). Where finer subdivisions than class level are used for specific or local use, these should be mutually exclusive, exhaustive and mappable to the class level of the national classification.

The classification has been designed to enable the finest level of desegregation needed for most purposes, including national statistics. Individual organisations or locations may need more detail for their own specific purposes. In these cases, they may wish to add an extra level of detail to the classification structure such as the activity type 'personal assistance'. This level of classification is sufficient for the purposes of a national classification. However, in order to have the appropriate match of staff expertise available the service provider will need to divide personal assistance into a number of categories or subclasses, for example, hair care as opposed to showering and dressing. The finest level category for the national classification should be determined on practical grounds, such as general program reporting needs.

Coding structure

The classification hierarchy has an alphanumeric 6 digit coding structure. The services activities classification carries an 'A' prefix to distinguish it from other classifications. For example:

A01 Personal and social support

This section comprises activities that provide support for personal or social functioning in daily life. Such activities promote the development of personal skills for successful functioning as individuals, family members and members of the wider community.

Personal and social support includes the provision of information, advice and referral, personal advocacy, counselling, domestic assistance and personal assistance. The purpose of such support may be to enable individuals to live and function in their own homes or normal places of residence (where this is an independent residence).

This section consists of the following groups of activities:

A01.1	Information, advice and referral
A01.2	Personal support
A01.3	Community living support
A01.4	Daily living support
A01.9	Other personal and social support

A01.1 Information, advice and referral

This group covers activities that provide information, advice and referral to support personal or social functioning and/or to facilitate access to and use of community services and resources.

Advice differs from information in that it suggests or recommends particular courses of action. Both information and advice infer that it is up to the recipient to follow up. A referral is where action is taken to contact another service provider and arrange an appointment or interview.

General exclusions

- Provision of information with the aim of reaching a community or community group—code under <u>A07.2</u> *Community/group development and support*
- Activities intended to reach service providers—code under <u>A07.1</u> *Service support* and development

A01.2.03 Mutual support and self help

A01.2.04 Grief counselling

Activities that help victims of incest/sexual abuse to assess their circumstances and relationships, and to make choices, decisions and plans for the future. Refers to one-to-one discussion sessions with the client, usually provided on more than one occasion, dealing with incest or sexual abuse.

A01.2.06 Domestic violence counselling

A01.2.07 Crisis counselling

Activities that help victims experiencing some form of crisis to assess their circumstances and relationships, and to make choices, decisions and plans for the future. Help is provided by discussions with trained counsellors.

A01.2.08 Counselling, other

Activities that help service users to assess their circumstances and relationships, and to make choices, decisions and plans for the future. Help is provided by discussions with trained counsellors in individual and group sessions.

This class is used where the activities of counselling apply to a range of circumstances or cover a combination of types specified in classes A01.2.04–A02.1.07 or specific types of counselling not covered by classes A01.2.04–A01.2.07.

Include

- Gambling counselling
- Post-traumatic stress counselling

Exclude

• Financial counselling. Code as <u>A01.1.03</u> Financial advice, information and referral.

- Meals provided at centres where the primary activity is recreational

Exclude

 Educational courses concerning issues of interest to a community and/or aimed at the community. Code under group <u>A07.2</u> Community/group development and support.

Activities included in this class generally entail more intensive support than those of group <u>A01.2 Personal support</u>.

- Meals provided at centres where the primary activity is assistance with living skills

Exclude

• Activities without a primary focus on development. Code as <u>A01.3.02</u> *Recreation/leisure*.

A01.3.05 Community transport

• Transport provided on an individual basis, for example, escorting an individual to day care or to a job interview. Code as <u>A01.4.05</u> Social support, escorting, visiting and personal transport.

A01.3.06 Community placement

Activities that assist people who are disadvantaged (in terms of their capacity for independent living) in gaining access to suitable community housing arrangements and to other appropriate community resources and services that will help maintain them in such accommodation.

Include

- Assistance in obtaining suitable accommodation and support
- Placement/outreach support for women and children leaving women's refuges
- Adolescent community placement

Exclude

- Placement of children in substitute care in a household/family setting (that is, the placement of a child in a private household for the purpose of safe custody until such time as protective issues are addressed by statutory authorities). Code as A02.4.02 Out of home care placement and post-placement supervision.
- Provision of actual accommodation combined with assistance to subsequently obtain suitable accommodation in the community. Code to the predominant activity under *A05.4 Transitional and crisis accommodation*.
- Support towards obtaining suitable accommodation, such as counselling (code as <u>A01.2.08</u> Counselling, other) or housing information/advice generally (code as <u>A01.1.05</u> Housing/tenancy information, advice and referral)
- Provision of accommodation for children whose families face a crisis situation and the provision of transitional accommodation (that is, accommodation for children who will eventually be cared for by their own families, or by alternative long-term caregivers). - Activities involving the operation of accommodation facilities such as retirement villages and self-care units. Code as <u>A05.1.99</u> Residential care and supported accommodation for aged persons not elsewhere classified.

A01.3.99 Community living support activities not elsewhere classified

Use this class for community living support activities that are:

- not specifically covered by classes A01.3.01-A01.3.06
- not sufficiently detailed or where the type is unknown.

A01.4 Daily living support

Such activities include assistance with personal tasks, (for example, showering, dressing and grooming) and domestic tasks (for example, washing, cooking, cleaning, shopping, gardening) and companionship.

The classification has not been developed to code activities directly related to acute health care, such as 'hospital in the home'. Nevertheless, such activities can be included under code <u>A01.4.99</u> Daily living support not elsewhere classified, if necessary.

If provided as part of residential support, code under the appropriate class in <u>A05</u> Residential care and supported accommodation.

A01.4.03 Home maintenance

Activities of maintenance and repair of homes, gardens and yards, to keep them in a safe and habitable condition.

Include

• Alterations/modifications to facilitate access/mobility

Exclude

Provision of special equipment, (for example, wheelchairs) and materials to people with disabilities to enhance their ability to function in the community. Code as <u>A04.2.01</u> Special equipment and materials.

Coding of activities in program-specific collections

A01.4.04 Community nursing care

Provision of personal care, health care, treatment and supervision in the home of the recipient, in relation to non-acute or post-acute health problems.

The purpose of non-residential nursing care services may be to facilitate stabilisation and assist with health management or to enable recipients to live in their own homes.

• Non-residential nursing care services.

Exclude

• Nursing care provided in conjunction with accommodation and other types of support, the purpose of which may be to provide ongoing or long-term nursing care. Code under section A05 Residential care and supported accommodation.

A01.4.05 Social support, escorting, visiting and personal transport

Provision of social support, companionship and reassurance of safety to people living at home and in need of support, escorting or other special transport provision to enable them to access community services and facilities.

A01.4.06 Food service

Delivery of meals, food shopping and preparation, and advice provided to the place of residence for people unable to provide adequate meals for themselves.

- Activities associated with Meals on Wheels
- Meals provided at roadside spots and other community locations

Exclude

- Meals provided at centres. Code as the primary activity, that is, <u>A01.3.02</u> *Recreation/leisure* or <u>A01.3.03</u> *Living skills development*.
- Provision of meals on an emergency basis. Code as <u>A04.2.03</u> Food provision.

A01.4.07 Allied health/paramedical care

Provision of allied health care such as therapy support for individuals, early childhood intervention and drug/alcohol support or intervention of an allied health or paramedical nature.

- Consultancy to other professionals

Coding of activities in program-specific collections

A01.9 Other personal and social support

This group covers personal and social support activities which cannot be assigned to a specific group within section A01, either because:

- the activity types are specified but do not fit within any of groups A01.1-A01.4, or
- the activity type is not known/not specified.

Do not code to this group if the activity can be assigned to a '99' class within another group.

This group is comprised of a single class.

A02 Support for children, families and carers

The provision of care, educational, developmental and recreational activities for children usually between the ages of 0 and 12 years by paid workers. Child care enables parents to participate in employment, education and training, community activities, and personal activities. Child care and preschool are also important in supporting children's social, physical, emotional and intellectual development.

This section consists of the following groups of activities:

A02.1 Child care and preschool

The provision of care, educational, developmental and recreational activities for children usually between the ages of 0 and 12 years by paid workers. Child care enables parents to participate in employment, education and training, community activities, and personal activities. Child care and preschool are also important in supporting children's social, physical, emotional and intellectual development.

General exclusions

- Baby sitting
- Primary school attendance

Day care centre for severely disabled people. Code as <u>A01.3.03</u> Living skills development.

A02.1.02 Preschool

The provision of educational and developmental services by an appropriately qualified teacher, to children in the year (or, in some jurisdictions, two years) before they begin full-time primary education.

A02.1.03 Occasional care

The provision of care and developmental activities for children primarily under school age on a non-regular basis, normally for short periods of time.

Include

- Adjunct care
- Occasional day care
- Care facilities at sporting venues, shopping centres or medical centres

A02.1.04 Outside school hours care

The provision of care and recreational activities for children attending primary school and out of school hours care. Includes 'before/after school care' and 'vacation care'. 'Before/after school care' is provided on school days at times when school is not in session (that is, before school, after school and 'pupil-free' days). 'Vacation care' is provided during school vacation periods.

A02.1.99 Child care and preschool not elsewhere classified

This class is used for activities that are:

- not specifically covered by classes A02.1.01–A02.1.05
- not sufficiently detailed or where the type is unknown
- (the activity type is) not known/not specified

Coding of activities in program-specific collections

A02.2 Child protection

Activities that seek to protect children from child abuse and neglect or harm, through statutory intervention and support for families. Activities include the investigation of child abuse and neglect or harm and case management of children who were found to have been abused or neglected or harmed.

A02.2.01 Protective investigation

Activities that involve responding to and investigating reports or notifications of child abuse or neglect or harm to a child. Includes gathering of information and interviewing of family members.

• Post-investigation intervention to provide protection

A02.2.02 Protective case management

The provision of case management of children in need of statutory protection. Includes applying to the court for a care and protection order, the supervision of children on care and protection orders, and the placement and management of children in out of home care.

Include

- Removal to alternative care
- Application for a child protection order to the Children's Court
- Out of home care management: provision of statutory case management of out of home placement and support by professional welfare staff. Daily care activities may be formally contracted to a non-government organisation

A02.2.03 Intensive family support

Activities that seek to prevent the separation of families where there are child protection concerns or seek to reunify families where separation has already occurred. Activities focus on improving family functioning and are generally intensive and short term in nature.

A02.2.99 Child protection activities not elsewhere classified

Use this class for child protection activities that are:

• not specifically covered by classes A02.2.01–A02.2.02 or where the type is unknown.

A02.3 Adoption

Activities that arrange for the placement of children, who for various reasons cannot live with their birth parents, with adoptive parents.

Classes

A02.3.01	Assessment of adoptive parents
A02.3.02	Adoption placement and post-placement supervision
A02.3.99	Adoption activities not elsewhere classified

Coding guide

A02.3.01 Assessment of adoptive parents

Activities that seek to assess the eligibility and suitability of people to become adoptive parents. This includes consideration of the personal characteristics of the applicants and their ability to provide a secure and beneficial environment for a child.

A02.3.02 Adoption placement and post-placement supervision

Activities that arrange for the placement of children with adoptive parents and follow up on the outcomes of these placements.

• Pre-adoptive care

A02.3.99 Adoption activities not elsewhere classified

Use this class for adoption activities that are:

- not specifically covered by classes A02.3.01–A02.3.02 or where the type is unknown
- not sufficiently detailed or where the type is unknown

A02.4 Out of home care

Out of home care is one of a range of a services provided to children who are in need of care and protection, and their families. This type of service assists and supports children and young people in a variety of care arrangements other than with their parents. These arrangements include foster care, placements with relatives or kin, and residential care. In most cases, children in out of home care will also be on a care and protection order of some kind.⁸

Activities that place children in out of home care including foster care, placements with relatives or kin, and residential care and the follow up on the outcomes of these placements. Care is provided to a child by one or more adults who act as substitute parents.

- Pre-adoptive care.

Exclude

 Adoption placement. Code as <u>A02.3.02</u> Adoption placement and post-placement supervision.

The nature of the other types of support is such that live-in, rostered or visiting persons assist with necessary day-to-day living tasks (which the intended users cannot do themselves, or can only do with help), provide intensive forms of care (for example, nursing care) and provide assistance towards independent living (for example, legal assistance, retrieval of personal belongings, advocacy and counselling).

Resident Classification Scale (RCS) The RCS is a nationally consistent instrument which assesses a care recipient's care needs. This scale has 8 classification levels ranging from low care (RCS 8) to high care (RCS 1), with each level having a specified subsidy level which is paid to the provider for providing the required care to the care recipient. The RCS was introduced with the amalgamation of hostels and nursing homes into one system of care on 1 October 1997, replacing the RCI (nursing homes) and the PCAI (hostels).¹⁰

- Residential respite high level care: provision of accommodation and other support with a high level of support needs at a special-purpose facility to enable regular carers of older people to have a period of relief or respite. Residential respite care activities include the provision of accommodation and meals, and assistance with dressing, showering, grooming and eating.
- Residential palliative care: provision of health treatment, supervision and support in a residential facility, which is aimed at maintaining or improving the comfort of a patient who is, or who would otherwise be, in pain or distress. This includes hospice care.

A07.1.03 Provision of training and training resources

• Internal training activities, such as those provided by a service provider for its own staff or by a government agency for its own staff

Coding of activities in program-specific collections

CSTDA see code 7.02 in Table A3

A07.1.04 Volunteer resource development and placement

Provision of volunteers with knowledge about the roles, functions, activities and policies of a range of non–government organisations, with training in discharging their duties and responsibilities as volunteers, and with referrals to registered service providers.

Include

Community Link and Network services, recruitment, training, supervision and support of volunteers who go into homes to offer friendship, support and advice regarding daily living matters especially with regard to raising and caring for children

Exclude

• A service provider's development of its own volunteers (code to the appropriate activity type carried out by the service provider)

A07.1.05 Management consultancy/advice

Provision of advice to other organisations on matters such as legal incorporation, management structures, financial management and accountability, staff management and strategic planning.

Exclude

 Internal consultancy/advisory activities, such as legal services; personnel management areas of government agencies

A07.1.99 Service support and development not elsewhere classified

Use this class for service support and development activities that are:

- not specifically covered by classes A07.1.01–A07.1.05
- not sufficiently detailed or where the type is unknown.

Coding of activities in program-specific collections

A07.2 Community/group development and support

Activities relating to the promotion of greater public awareness of social issues, and to the development and support of local community centre based activities, special interest groups and cultural groups. Such activities aim to enhance the capacity of individuals/groups for participation, independence and interdependence within their community and for improving the social/physical environment of their community or community of interest.

Activities that aim to change or maintain existing social policies and programs by taking community action on, and lobbying appropriate organisations about, social policy issues of relevance to the general public or to specific groups.

Include

Social action activities of peak consumer or service provider organisations

Exclude

- Individual advocacy (code as <u>A01.2.01</u> Individual Advocacy)
- Cultural group development (code as <u>A07.2.03</u> Cultural group development)
- Community action on local issues (code as <u>A07.2.02</u> Community/community centre based development and support)

A07.3.03 Welfare fundraising

Activities that raise funds specifically for use in the delivery of community services.

Exclude

 Activities that raise funds for other purposes such as health services, operational costs of religious organisations; overseas aid organisations

A07.3.99 Social planning, social action and group advocacy not elsewhere classified

Use this class for social planning, social action and group advocacy activities that are:

- not specifically covered by classes A07.3.01–A07.3.03
- not sufficiently detailed or where the type is unknown.

Coding of activities in program-specific collections

CSTDA see code 7.01 in Table A3

A07.9 Service and community development and support generally

This group covers community/group development and support activities that cannot be assigned to a specific group within section A07, either because:

- the activity types are specified but do not fit within any of groups A07.1–A07.3, or
- the activity type is not known/not specified.

Do not code to this group if the activity can be assigned to a '99' class within another group.

This group is comprised of a single class.

A07.9.99 Service and community development and support not elsewhere classified

Use this class for service and community development and support activities that are:

• not sufficiently detailed or where the type is unknown.

A08 Other community services activities

This section is reserved for activities that cannot be assigned to one of the sections A01–A07 either because:

- the activity types are specified but do not fit within any of sections A01–A07, or
- the activity type is not known/not specified.

Do not code to this group if the activity can be assigned to a '9' group within another section.

A08.1 Other community services activities

This group is comprised of a single class.

A08.1.99 Other community services activities not elsewhere classified

Use this class for other community services activities that are:

• not sufficiently detailed or where the type is unknown.

National Community Services Data Dictionary

An important function of this classification is to provide a detailed range of allowed values for grouping data (the data domain) for three data elements defined in NCSDD:

- Assistance type, (pp. 184–5), ID=000538

 Definition: 'The type of assistance provided by a community service agency in response to a client's request for assistance or a contact or referral event. The types of service(s) or support should be classified in terms of [service] activities and should relate to a particular service event or service episode'.
- Assistance type requested, (pp. 175–6), ID=000601 Definition: 'The type(s) of assistance that a person or persons may request from a community services agency'.
- Service types available, (pp. 124–5), ID=000603 Definition: 'The type(s) of services that a community services agency is usually able to offer or provide to persons'.

The classification of service activity is founded on the concept that:

Service activity

Is a discrete component of the process of assistance in the context of providing a service.

National Community Services Information Model

'Service activity' as used here is consistent with the entity subtype ACTIVITY of the entity SERVICE of the National Community Services Information Model.

Guide to use

Purpose

The purpose of the settings classification is to provide a basis for consistent classification of the diverse range of settings in which services are provided by organisations in the community services sector. The principal areas of use of the settings classification are:

- to describe the setting(s) in which services are provided, to describe the contexts in which programs/agencies deliver services;
- the recording, collection and provision of information about the settings in which
 assistance has been provided to clients (for example, administrative information
 kept by organisations in program-specific data collections, or in general surveys
 of the community services sector).

While this classification can be used in its own right to classify services delivery settings, it is expected that it will have much greater utility when used in conjunction with the other classifications and/or information about actual client numbers and their socio-demographic characteristics.

The national standard classification of service settings incorporates categories at **section**, **group** and **class** level. Its adoption for agency-specific and program reporting use is supported and encouraged by the National Community Services Information Management Group.

Scope

These classifications are organised to reflect the priority placed by service providers on assisting clients in maintaining their independence in the community.




Figure 2: Diagrammatic representation of the community services settings classifications

Figure 2 shows the four sections of this classification. Section 1 of the setting classification provides information about independent living and community and electronic settings. All settings in this section are non-institutional and they form a major section of the setting classification. Group 1 classifies a number of types of independent living situations such as private dwellings and living informally (living in squats or living rough). Group 2 of this section shows the community settings in which these services are provided and Group 3 describes electronic settings in which clients receive assistance such as telephone or on the internet.

Section 2 provides information on the various types of supported accommodation settings where a provider supports the client to live independently in accommodation owned by the provider.

Section 3 describes the settings where services are provided to those in need of higher levels of support. This includes residential settings where the client no longer lives in a household environment.

Section 4 classifies settings where community services are provided to people in a commercial or industrial setting. It is closer in nature to Section 1 than Sections 2 and 3.

Main changes from Version 1

The changes from Version 1 include updating of terms to reflect current usage, and greater attention to areas of more recently expanded policy focus such as supported independent living and residential care. Section 1 has been revised and now combines independent and community-based settings; in the previous edition these were two separate sections. Details of the changes are in <u>Table B1</u>.

Community services are increasingly providing activities to clients in the community and not in institutions. For this reason the classifications have been adjusted to reflect the move away from institutionalisation, and to enable users to classify and analyse the mix of services provided by community services providers to clients in the varied settings such as independent living setting, supported accommodation and residential care.

Coverage additional to Version 1 in this edition includes:

- settings such as residential care facilities that provide longer term care in conjunction with accommodation and other types of support;
- settings where assistance is provided with day-to-day living tasks and assistance towards independent living;

• short-term housing assistance settings such as crisis and transitional accommodation.

Application

The principal use of the setting classification is to **code** the locations where community services are provided. A service delivery setting may be a private home, a park or a telephone wherever the activity is provided to the client.

A community service setting is where a core activity that addresses a specific need occurs. For example the setting of Meals on Wheels is the provision of healthy meals that are delivered to the client's home in order to assist in maintaining independence in the home. In this case the setting for this community service would be one of the classes in *S1.1 Independent living*.

The provision of domestic assistance is conducted in a client's home, so this would be coded as *S1.1.01 Owner/purchaser/renter occupied dwelling*.

Counselling can be provided in many of the settings described in the classification. The ability to differentiate where the counselling took place is one of the benefits of the settings classification.

Structure

Development of national classifications of community services commenced in 1993 and proceeded in consultation with representatives of Australian community services departments, the ABS, the AIHW and the non-government sector. Version 1 of the classifications (*National Classifications of Community Services* Version 1.0) was published by AIHW in 1997 and included a classification of service delivery settings which specified the data domain¹³ for the data element¹⁴ *Type of service delivery setting* (*ID 000539*) specified in the *National Community Services Data Dictionary* Version 1.0 (NCSDDv1)¹⁵.

National Community Services Data Dictionary

This revised classification is aligned with relevant revisions in *the National Community Services Data Dictionary* Version 2.0 (NCSDD)¹⁶, published in 2000, and has the additional aim of providing a stable national framework that at the same time can be

consistent with the reporting needs of service providers, jurisdictions and national program managers.

The service delivery settings classification now provides the data domain for the revised data element *service delivery setting* defined in the NCSDD (*ID=000539*, pp. 135-6) as:

Service delivery setting

Is the type of physical setting in which a service is provided to a client, irrespective of whether or not this is the same as the usual location of the service providing agency.¹⁷

National Community Services Information Model

In terms of the National Community Services Information Model Version 1.0, SERVICE DELIVERY SETTING is an entity subtype of SETTING, which is in turn a subtype of the entity LOCATION.

Correspondence with related classifications

While the National Community Services Information Management Group (NCSIMG) supports the use of the national standard classifications, it also recognises that implementation will take some time. As an aid to improving consistency across the sector, the relationships with classifications currently in use for the following national data sets are included here:

- Home and Community Care (HACC)
- Commonwealth State/Territory Disability Agreement (CSTDA)
- Supported Accommodation Assistance Program (SAAP).

Classification hierarchy

(Section) > Group > Class > (sub-class)

The adoption of the national standard classification of service delivery settings for agency-specific and program reporting use is supported and encouraged by the NCSIMG. It incorporates categories at group and class level only. As indicated, in discussing the place of SERVICE DELIVERY SETTING in the National Community Services Information Model, it is a subtype of SETTING, an entity subtype of LOCATION. Thus in theoretical terms, *service delivery setting* could be considered as a section-level category of a classification of location types. As it is not intended to consider other types of settings or location, only the classification of service delivery settings is developed here.

At each level of the hierarchy, the classification is designed to be mutually exclusive and exhaustive. That is, any individual setting can only be classified in one way, and

every individual record can be assigned and accounted for. The coding framework allows for general and 'not elsewhere classified' categories to allow for this. Where finer sub-divisions than class level are used for specific or local use, these should be mutually exclusive, exhaustive and mappable to the class level of the national standard classification.

Guide to coding of community service settings

The classification hierarchy has an alphanumeric six digit coding structure. The service delivery setting classification carries an 'S' prefix to distinguish it from other classifications (for example, service activity). For example:

Appendix A2 Home and Community Care (HACC)

The Home and Community Care Program is a national program whose National Minimum Data Set is based on data definitions of the HACC Data Dictionary Version 1.0, many of which are common to the National Community Services Data Dictionary. This classification is related to the data domains for:

- Primary type of assistance received (HACC Data Dictionary Version 1.0, 9.5.5–2, pp. 90–97):
 - 'The primary type of assistance that the person receives from the agency during a service delivery event.'
- Assistance with goods and equipment received (HACC Data Dictionary Version 1.0, 9.5.5–7, pp. 107–8, 135–6):

'The goods or equipment provided to the person (by purchase or loan) on a HACC service event.'

The relationship is summarised in Table A2, and direction on coding to national classes is included in the coding guide in the *Coding of activities in program–specific collections*. The 'goods and equipment' item lists about 50 different forms of assistance, but these should all be coded to <u>A04.2.99</u> Material assistance not elsewhere classified.

Appendix A4 Supported Accommodation Assistance Program (SAAP)

SAAP agencies provide supported accommodation and other assistance to clients. The SAAP data references are the SAAP National Data Collection Data Dictionary Version 2.0 (November 2001) and the SAAP National Data Collection Collectors Manual (July 2001). The key item that relates to the purpose of the national classification is the service delivery model from the Administrative Data Collection. However, service activities are also covered in the National Data Collection, the Unmet Demand Collection and the Casual Client Collection.

Note: except for the Administrative Data Collection, which is intended to indicate the predominant activity, the classifications of the other SAAP items considered here are collected on a multiple response basis.

SAAP Administrative Data Collection

The relevant data item is:

• Service delivery model (Data Dictionary Version 2.0, A4.1, p. 70): 'The predominant mode or manner in which a service is provided by an agency, or the broad category for which the agency is funded.'

Table A4 matches the SAAP classification scheme to the NCCS Version 2.

SAAP National Data Collection

The questions in the data collection relating to type of service activity ask about provision of accommodation and about other kinds of support with possible responses being <code>needed/provided/referral arranged/not provided or referred</code>. Thus activities are identified in terms of provision or referral and can be matched to relevant codes. Equivalent items are collected for the ongoing collection for high-volume agencies.

The data items are:

- need for specialist services identified/referral made (Data Dictionary 2.0, C7.3, pp. 49–50/HV7.1, p. 63):
 - 'Identification of a client's need for specialist services, which cannot be met by the SAAP agency providing support and whether an appropriate referral has been made.'
- assistance provided (Data Dictionary Version 2.0, C8.3, p. 55/HV8.1, p. 63): 'Assistance and/or advocacy provided directly to the client by the agency.'

These data items share the same classification scheme. Table A5 shows the matching codes of the classification.

• assistance provided to accompanying child(ren) (Data Dictionary 2.0, C8.4, p. 56): 'Assistance provided to an accompanying child(ren). An accompanying child is a dependant of a client who resides with, or is accommodated with, the client during the period s/he receives support'.

This classification scheme is based on the Data Dictionary, but extended in the 2001 Collectors Manual to cover several classes of the classification for C7.3/C8.3.¹⁸ Table A6 shows the matching codes of the classification.
