Trends

The ABS five-yearly census of population and housing provides excellent data on long term employment trends and on the labour force characteristics of persons with a highest qualification in nursing, not all of whom may be registered or enrolled.

Total health industry employment increased by 18.9% between 1986 and 1996, but nurse employment in this industry increased by just 2.2%. A 47.3% fall in nurse employment in psychiatric hospitals and a 4.7% fall in employment in nursing homes were offset by a 36.3% increase in employment in medical practices and an 80.6% increase in employment at community health centres.

Significant changes also occurred among nurse occupations between 1986 and 1996:

- There was a 46.5% decline in the number of directors of nursing and a 1.6% reduction in the number of nurse managers. Enrolled nurse numbers fell by 37.8%.
- Midwife numbers increased by 39.0%, and the number of registered mental health nurses rose by 11.3% and of developmental disability nurses by 55.1%.
- In the support occupations, the number of nursing assistants increased by 27.1% from 20,402 to 25,941, while 'personal care assistant' emerged as a newly classified occupation with 16,706 persons.

Labour force participation

The census provides data on labour force participation by persons with a highest qualification in nursing. There were 329,666 persons with a highest qualification in nursing in Australia in 1996, and 186,144 persons employed in nursing, including dental nursing.

There were some differences in labour force participation between Australian-born nurses with a highest qualification in nursing and overseas-born nurses who obtained their qualification in Australia. Australian-born nurses appear to retire earlier than overseas-born nurses. In the 55–64 year age group, 50.2% of Australian-born nurses were not in the labour force, compared with 24.7% of overseas-born nurses in that age group. In the 65 and over age group, only 7.0% of Australian-born nurses were still working, compared with 35.3% of overseas-born nurses, although the numbers of the latter were small.

In the age group under 25 years, the reverse pattern applies, with 15.8% of overseas-born nurses not in the labour force, compared with 7.3% of Australian born nurses.

In terms of leakage from the nursing workforce to other occupations, the census data appears to indicate that this does not occur substantially until the 35-44 year age group. In this group, 6,700 Australian qualified nurses were found to be working in non-nursing occupations, although some of these would be working as administrators, researchers and academics in nursing.

A further analysis of leakage from the nursing workforce can be seen in Table 72, using data from the 1996 national nursing labour force survey. This tabulates the labour force status by age group of nurses who were registered or enrolled in 1996 but not employed in nursing:

- of the 3,503 nurses overseas, one-third were under 30 years of age and a further 40% were in their 30s,
- among nurse graduates under 25 years of age, 251 were employed in non-nursing jobs. The numbers employed in non-nursing jobs increased to 788 for 25–29 year olds, 1,314 for 30–34 year olds and peaked at 1,932 for the 35–39 year age group. Overall, there were 9,094 registered and enrolled nurses employed in jobs outside nursing, with 2,161 of these looking for work in nursing at the time of the survey.
