### Preface

There is increasing concern about the adequacy of the nursing workforce in each State and Territory, and for Australia as a whole, particularly its capacity to cope with the growing proportion of older age groups in the population. Some of the concerns that have been raised include the proportion of trained nurses who choose not to nurse, the ageing of the nursing workforce and falling student numbers. Several inquiries into various aspects of nursing are now underway.

The nursing workforce is surveyed every two years at the time of registration renewal. This publication largely reports the results of the 1997 survey, but it also contains information relating to registration numbers in 1999, nurse training in 1999 and 1998–99 migration data. It is expected that the results from the 1999 survey will be available soon.
