1 Introduction

Background

In 1990, the Australian Health Ministers' Advisory Council commissioned the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare to develop national health labour force statistics about the major registrable health professions. Data collections based on a national minimum data set were developed addressing the labour force planning needs of the health professions, government, service providers and educational institutions. In addition to nursing, published data from the collection are available for medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, podiatry and physiotherapy.

Scope and coverage

The scope of the data is all nurses registered or enrolled with the nurses board or nursing council in each State and Territory as eligible to practise nursing.

The coverage may exclude nurses who registered for the first time during the current year. These nurses may not be required to renew their registration if the initial registration in that State or Territory has occurred within a short time before the standard renewal date.

Method

The main data in this publication were obtained from a nurse labour force survey conducted by each State and Territory nurses board on behalf of the Institute. Each State and Territory nurses board conducts an annual renewal of registrations and a survey questionnaire was sent to all nurses as part of the registration renewal process. Each State and Territory health authority forwarded a computer file of the survey data to the Institute for aggregation into a national dataset.

Nurse labour force survey response rate

Based on the total of the registrations in each State and Territory, the response rate to the survey was 81.5% in 1993 and 79.8% in 1994. The response rate for each year and State is shown in the table below. The overall response rate can only be estimated, and not determined with complete accuracy, because it is known that at least some nurses who were registered in more than one State or Territory completed a questionnaire in just one State or Territory and not in the others in which they were registered. The incidence of this occurrence cannot be ascertained because matching survey records among States and Territories is not possible.

Labour force estimates

Nurses may register in more than one State or Territory. Therefore, in estimating the nursing labour force, it is important to reduce as much as possible the duplication in statistics which arises from multiple registrations.

The estimation of the number and characteristics of currently employed nurses in each State and Territory was based on the responses of those nurses employed solely or mainly in the State or Territory of registration. Nurses who were on leave for three months or more were employed but they were excluded from most tables of employed nurses because the data presented were not collected from nurses on leave.

Estimation of State and Territory numbers of nurses looking for work in nursing was based on the number of persons with usual residence in the State or Territory of registration who were not employed in nursing and looking for work in nursing.

For all estimates, the assumption was made that non-respondents to the survey had the same labour force characteristics as respondents, and the survey data were scaled up to the registrations in each State and Territory by distributing the non-response numbers on the basis of this assumption. This process may overestimate the number of nurses in the labour force if non-respondents were more likely to be those with multiple registrations not in their home State or Territory or not in the nursing labour force.

For those States and Territories for which initial registration data were available for non-respondents to the survey, the age distribution of non-respondents was very similar to that of respondents with only two exceptions: there was a higher non-response for nurses aged under 25 years and 65 years and over.

Collection timing

The labour force survey is conducted by the nurses registration board in each State and Territory in conjunction with the annual renewal of practice licences. Therefore, the timing of the survey depends on the licence renewal procedure which operates in each State and Territory. Nurses registering for the first time are not included in the survey at initial registration because they would generally have no previous nursing job for which details could be provided.

In New South Wales renewal of registration is due on the anniversary of initial registration; thus, the survey is conducted throughout the year. The New South Wales data consist of all responses received during the calendar year.

South Australia has four renewal periods each year with about one-quarter of nurses registered in each period. The survey returns from each quarterly renewal period are accumulated for a calendar year.

In Tasmania, licence renewal was staggered with monthly dispatches throughout the year. The Tasmanian data are all responses in the fiscal year of July to June. In 1995, a uniform licence expiry date of 31 August was introduced.

The remaining States and Territories have annual renewals due by a fixed date. In Victoria, registration renewal notices and the survey are dispatched around the end of October for return by 31 December. In 1994, the registration period was in June to coincide with the implementation of the *Nurses Act 1993*.

In Queensland, the renewal and survey period was from 1 July to 30 September in 1993. The annual licence period changed in 1994 to the period from 1 April to 30 June.


Western Australia has an annual renewal of licences in November–December with licence renewal due by 31 December.

In the Australian Capital Territory, annual renewals and the survey are in the period November to January. The 1993 survey was conducted in February 1994, independently of the registration renewal process, whereas the 1994 survey was conducted with the registration renewal process at the end of 1994.

The Northern Territory conducts licence renewal and the survey during May–June in each year.

The collection period in each State and Territory is shown schematically below.

Identification of registered and enrolled nurses

The 1993 and 1994 survey questionnaires did not have a question which identified whether a nurse was on the register or the roll in each State and Territory because it was assumed that this would be readily available from the registering authority.

In both years, a means of positively identifying whether a respondent to the survey was on the register or the roll was provided for New South Wales, Queensland and Tasmania. This enabled accurate data for these States to be compiled by nurse type for nurses who were on leave, overseas and not employed in nursing. For all other States and Territories, nurses were identified as registered or enrolled by their job classification. Not all employed nurses answered this question, and nurses on leave, overseas, unemployed or not in the labour force were not required to answer this question.

Additional data sources

Additional data were obtained as follows:

- data for students enrolled in and completing higher education courses from the Department of Employment, Education, Training and Youth Affairs;
- international migration data from the Department of Immigration and Multicultural Affairs;
- data for overseas nurses applying to practise in Australia from the Australian Nursing Council;
- data for employed nurses as collected via the five-yearly national population census conducted between 1971 and 1991, and quarterly in the monthly labour force survey conducted between 1989 and 1996 from the Australian Bureau of Statistics: and
- data on the number of certified nurses in other countries from the OECD Health Data File, 1996.

2 Overview

Overall numbers

- In 1994 there were 227,966 nurses employed in Australia—an increase of 4.0% on the number employed in 1993. Registered nurses made up 76.5% of these, compared with 75.7% in 1993. The other 23.5% were enrolled nurses.
- In the nursing labour force in 1994, 14,259 nurses (5.9%) were not employed in nursing and were looking for work in nursing.
- Overseas employment was popular for nurses registered in Australia in 1994; 4,218 were working in other countries.
- Also out of the Australian labour force in 1994 were 22,527 registered and enrolled nurses who were not employed in nursing and not looking for work in nursing.
- Of those employed in nursing in 1994, excluding those on extended leave, 91.0% were working as clinicians, 3.8% as administrators, 2.1% as teachers or educators, 0.3% as researchers and the remaining 2.9% in other nursing occupations including public health and union organising.
- There were 1,262.1 employed nurses per 100,000 population in 1994: 966.8 registered nurses and 295.3 enrolled nurses per 100,000 population.

Age

• Female nurses, on average, were slightly older than males. For registered nurses, females were an average of 39.7 years compared with 37.9 years for males in 1994, and for enrolled nurses, females were 37.4 years compared with 36.5 years for males.

Hours worked

• Male registered nurses worked an average of 39.0 hours per week in 1994 while females averaged 31.9 hours. For enrolled nurses, males worked an average of 36.8 hours per week and females 30.5 hours. This difference was a result of the higher proportion of females who worked part-time hours—49.1% of female registered nurses and 58.2% of female enrolled nurses compared with only 13.4% and 27.1% respectively for males.

Classification

• A larger proportion (63.8%) of female registered nurses were level 1 registered nurses, the lowest classification, compared with males (55.3%) in 1994, while a smaller proportion were classified as assistant directors or directors of nursing (5.2% of females compared with 8.6% of males).

Main areas of practice

One-third of registered nurses employed as clinicians in 1994 were employed in the
areas of medical and surgical practice, followed by 14.6% in gerontology or geriatric
nursing. Enrolled nurses employed as clinicians were more likely to be employed in
gerontology or geriatric nursing (38.1%) while 33.2% were employed in the areas of
medical and surgical practice.

Sector of employment

- The main job of 70.4% of registered nurses in 1994 was in the public sector. Registered nurses employed in this sector were comprised of 70.4% in acute and psychiatric hospitals, 8.1% in nursing homes and 7.2% in community health centres. In the private sector, 45.7% worked in acute and psychiatric hospitals, 24.7% worked in nursing homes and 9.8% worked in private medical rooms.
- The main job of 69.3% of enrolled nurses was in the public sector in 1994. Just over half (51.4%) of enrolled nurses employed in the public sector worked in acute and psychiatric hospitals and a further 28.8% worked in nursing homes. In the private sector, 45.4% worked in nursing homes, 26.1% worked in acute and psychiatric hospitals and 8.3% worked in private medical rooms.

Rural employment

- The geographic distribution of employed nurses is very similar to that of the general population. This contrasts with other health professions where the numbers per 100,000 population are much lower in rural and remote areas than in metropolitan centres.
- Enrolled nurses were more likely to work in rural and remote areas than were registered nurses. Some 39.2% of enrolled nurses were working in rural and remote areas in 1994 while the remaining 60.8% were working in metropolitan areas. In comparison, 25.0% of registered nurses were working in rural areas and 75.0% in metropolitan areas.
- Female registered and enrolled nurses were more likely to be employed in rural and remote areas than their male counterparts. In 1994, 25.0% of female registered nurses and 39.7% of female enrolled nurses were working in rural and remote areas compared with 21.4% and 30.2% respectively of males.

Tertiary education

• In 1994, 11,581 students completed nursing courses at universities in Australia—7,279 (62.9%) completed basic nursing and 4,302 (37.1%) completed post-basic nursing courses. Females accounted for 89.4% of all completions. After growing by an average of 24.4% per year between 1989 and 1993 (during the changeover from hospital-based to university training), the number of completions increased by only 3.1% between 1993 and 1994.

Trends

- The nursing work force is now older and more highly trained than in the 1980s—a result of the change from hospital-based to university training and of declining numbers of enrolled nurses in the work force. In 1981, 33.3% of employed nurses were aged 15–24 years; by 1991 this had fallen to 14.6%. In 1989, 24.0% of nurses were enrolled; by 1996 this had fallen to 18.1%.
- From 1989 to 1996, declining employment of enrolled nurses and increasing employment of registered nurses resulted in a total nursing work force in Australia which was relatively stable in absolute numbers but reducing in numbers per 100,000 population and reducing in full-time equivalent numbers as a rising proportion of nurses worked part-time. In 1989, 39.2% of employed nurses were working part-time; by 1996 this had increased to 43.7%.
- From 1993 to 1996, there was a decline in registrations of registered nurses from 212,630 to 204,676, and of enrolled nurses from 68,825 to 56,616. However, there were significant State and Territory differences with a significant increase in registrations in New South Wales contrasting with a sharp decline in Victoria.

3 All registered and enrolled nurses

Total registrations

There were 261,292 registrations of registered and enrolled nurses in Australia in 1996—a three year decline of 7.2% since 1993.

This decrease was experienced in all States and Territories except New South Wales and the Northern Territory where the numbers increased by 3.2% and 12.4% respectively over the same period. The largest decline occurred in Victoria with a reduction of 16.0%.

Of the registrations in 1996, 204,676 (78.3%) were registered nurses and 56,616 (21.7%) were enrolled nurses in 1996. The proportion of registered nurses increased from 75.5% in 1993 to 78.3% in 1996.

Nursing labour force

- There were 278,673 registrations of registered and enrolled nurses in 1994. Excluding the estimated 9,703 multiple registrations, 242,225 (90.1%) were in the nursing labour force and 26,745 (9.9%) were not in the nursing labour force.
- Of those in the nursing labour force, 227,966 (94.1%) were employed, including 2,856 nurses who were on leave for 3 months or more, and 14,259 (5.9%) were looking for work in nursing.
- Of those employed in nursing, excluding those on extended leave, 91.0% were employed as clinicians, 3.8% as administrators, 2.1% as teachers or educators, 0.3% as researchers and the remaining 2.9% in other nursing occupations.
- In 1994 there were 1,262.1 employed nurses per 100,000 population, comprising 966.8 registered nurses and 295.3 enrolled nurses. Victoria had the highest number of nurses per 100,000 population (1,500.2) while the Australian Capital Territory had the lowest (1,017.9). Overall, the number of employed nurses per 100,000 population increased by 2.8% between 1993 and 1994.

Not in the nursing labour force

- Those not in the nursing labour force in 1994 consisted of 4,218 (15.8%) nurses working overseas and 22,527 (84.2%) nurses not looking for work in nursing (including 9,831 employed in an occupation other than nursing and 12,696 nurses who were not employed).
- The proportion of registered and enrolled nurses not in the nursing labour force decreased from 14.1% in 1993 to 9.9% in 1994 mainly as a result of a decline in the number of nurses not looking for work in nursing, suggesting a fall in the numbers willing to pay to maintain registration or enrolment when not seeking employment as a nurse.

Main areas of practice

• Of the 204,748 registered and enrolled nurses employed as clinicians in 1994, 33.2% were employed in the areas of medical and surgical practice, followed by 20.2% in gerontology or geriatric nursing. The distribution across specific areas of clinical nursing was relatively similar across all States and differed in the Territories where the younger age structures of the population resulted in a lower proportion of clinicians employed in gerontology and geriatric nursing and a higher proportion employed in obstetrics, gynaecology and midwifery (11.0% in the Australian Capital Territory and 10.6% in the Northern Territory compared with the national proportion of 7.2%). Also

in the Northern Territory, 12.5% of nurse clinicians were employed in community health compared with the national proportion of 3.0%.

Country of birth and initial qualification

- 77.3% of employed nurses in 1994 were born in Australia. This proportion differed slightly for registered (76.2%) and enrolled (80.6%) nurses. Almost half (46.3%) of those nurses who were not born in Australia were born in the United Kingdom or Ireland and 19.8% were born in Asian countries.
- 90.1% of employed registered and enrolled nurses in 1994 gained their initial
 qualification in Australia. Of those nurses who gained an initial qualification overseas,
 59.0% qualified in the United Kingdom or Ireland, 17.6% in New Zealand and 9.7% in
 Asia.

Citizenship

• In 1994, 92.1% of employed nurses were Australian citizens. This proportion was similar for registered (91.8%) and enrolled (92.9%) nurses. Nurses employed in the Australian Capital Territory were most likely to be Australian citizens (95.2%) while those employed in Western Australia were least likely to be Australian citizens (88.2%).




Figure 1: Employed nurses per 100,000 population: type of nurse and States and Territories, 1994

4 Trends in nursing employment and features of the nursing labour force at the 1991 census

This section presents data on registered, enrolled and dental nurses, collected by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) in the census of population and housing conducted every five years. It also presents data from 1989 to 1996 on registered and enrolled nurses collected every quarter by the ABS in the monthly labour force survey.

4.1 ABS population census statistics, 1971–91

Population census counts for employed health professionals are lower than estimates from labour force surveys because of differences in methodology. The census count is not adjusted to allow for non-response to the occupation question and some employed health professionals are enumerated in other occupations including administration, research and education. Nevertheless, census counts provide very useful five-yearly trend and intersectoral and interstate comparison statistics.

- At the 1991 census, 188,630 persons were employed in nursing—an increase of 3.5% since the 1986 census and 110.8% since the 1971 census. Of these, 174,610 (92.6%) were female. This proportion had declined slightly each census from 94.4% in 1971.
- There were 1,119.0 employed nurses per 100,000 population in 1991—an increase of 59.5% since 1971. The highest number of nurses per 100,000 population in 1991 was in Tasmania (1,404.0) and the lowest number was in the Australian Capital Territory (982.0). The number of employed nurses per 100,000 population increased from 701.7 at the 1971 census to 1,168.0 at the 1986 census before declining to 1,119.0 in 1991.
- 14.6% of employed nurses were aged less than 25 years in 1991, 85.1% were aged between 25 and 64 years and the remaining 0.3% were aged 65 years and over. This age distribution represented a significant change from the 1981 census when one-third of employed nurses were aged less than 25 years, 66.3% were aged 25 to 64 years and 0.4% were aged 65 years and over.
- 53.0% nurses were employed in hospitals (excluding psychiatric hospitals) at the 1991 census, 15.9% were employed in nursing homes, 19.9% in other health services and the remaining 11.2% in industries other than health.
- 55.8% nurses were employed in the public sector in 1991, a decline from 60.5% in 1981.
- Of employed nurses, 75.9% were born in Australia in 1991—a decrease of 2.2 percentage points from the 1981 census figure of 78.1% as a result of increased overseas nurse recruitment in the mid-1980s to address a nurse shortage.
- Of the 188,630 nurses employed at the 1991 census, 139,380 (73.9%) were registered, 39,670 (21.0%) were enrolled and 9,600 (5.1%) were dental nurses. This distribution varied across States and Territories. In South Australia, 70.0% of employed nurses were registered, 25.0% were enrolled and 5.1% were dental nurses, while the proportions in the Australian Capital Territory were 79.3%, 13.5% and 6.9% respectively.
- The number of registered nurses in 1991 had increased by 0.8% from 1986 while the number of enrolled nurses had increased 12.6% and dental nurses had increased 9.1%. These increases varied across the States and Territories. For registered nurses, the largest increase was recorded by the Northern Territory (17.2%) while decreases were recorded in Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania. For enrolled nurses, the largest increases were recorded by the Northern Territory (81.5%) and Queensland (38.3%) while the Australian Capital Territory recorded a decrease of 5.1%.



4.2 ABS labour force survey statistics, 1989–96

ABS labour force survey estimates of employment by occupation are collected quarterly. Annual averages of these quarterly estimates for nurses are provided in Table 16. Associated with these estimates are standard errors which are higher for the smaller States and Territories and particularly high for State and Territory estimates of enrolled nurses. Thus, care should be taken in interpreting annual figures for States and Territories because volatility in the sampling error causes most of the estimates to be unreliable. However, the national estimate has a much lower standard error and, therefore, provides a reliable picture of nursing trends in Australia.

From 1989 to 1996, the total nursing work force in Australia remained relatively stable in absolute numbers. Trends evident in the time series estimates include:

- Employment of enrolled nurses is declining while employment of registered nurses is increasing. Enrolled nurses, as a proportion of the total nursing work force, declined from 24.0% in 1989 to 18.1% in 1996. This overall decline was experienced by all States and Territories.
- The proportion of nurses working part-time is increasing. In 1996, 42.3% of registered nurses worked part-time and 50.3% of enrolled nurses worked part-time. These proportions had increased from 37.8% and 43.6% respectively since 1989.



4.3 Main features of the nursing labour force at the 1991 census

- Just over half (50.7%) of employed nurses were classified in the 1991 census as registered general nurses while a further 20.1% were identified as enrolled nurses and 4.9% as dental nurses. This breakdown varied among males and females: 41.1% of males were registered general nurses, 20.7% were enrolled nurses and 15.2% were registered psychiatric nurses; while only 1.7% of females were registered psychiatric nurses and 4.3% were registered midwives.
- There were significantly more employed registered and enrolled nurses per 100,000 population in capital city areas than in other areas in Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia and Tasmania. For the remaining States and the Northern Territory there were more nurses per 100,000 population in other areas than in the capital cities.
- Of those persons employed as registered and enrolled nurses at the 1991 census, 71.2% possessed a basic nursing qualification (72.4% of females and 57.9% of males) and 7.8% had a qualification in midwifery (8.4% of females and 1.3% of males). Males were more likely to have a qualification in psychiatric nursing (9.9% of males compared with 1.1% of females).
- Most (75.2%) employed registered and enrolled nurses were born in Australia. Of those born overseas, almost half (45.8%) were from the United Kingdom and Ireland, 19.9% were from Asia and 10.5% were from New Zealand.
- At the 1991 census, 334,151 persons reported that their highest qualification was in nursing (314,351 females and 19,800 males). Of these, 47.6% were employed as nurses while 21.3% were employed in an occupation other than nursing, 2.6% were unemployed (looking for work) and 28.0% were not in the labour force (not employed and not looking for work).
- Males whose highest qualification was in nursing were more likely to be employed than females (81.9% of males compared with 68.1% of females) and also more likely to be unemployed (4.0% compared with 2.6%) while females were more likely not to participate in the labour force (28.9% of females compared with 13.9% of males).

5 International comparison

Summary data for Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) countries are shown in Table 23. The OECD defines certified nurses as first level (nurses who have had a minimum of three years of formal training) and second level (nurses who have had between one and two years of formal training). Unfortunately, not all OECD countries use the same definition for certified nurses and formal training varies considerably across countries. A footnote has been used to indicate where the definitions are known to differ from the standard OECD definition.

These differences mean that comparisons with the OECD 'average' are not meaningful. However, Australia does appear to have a higher provision of nurses per 100,000 population than do other English-speaking countries in the OECD.

6 Registered nurses

Overall numbers

- In 1994, 174,367 nurses were employed in Australia, including 1,933 nurses on leave for three months or more—an increase of 5.0% on the number employed in 1993.
- In the nursing labour force in 1994, 10,394 registered nurses (5.6%) were not employed in nursing and were looking for work in nursing.
- 3,676 nurses registered in Australia in 1994 were working in other countries.
- Also not in the labour force in 1994 were 17,248 registered nurses who were not employed in nursing and not looking for work in nursing.
- The proportion of registered nurses who were not employed in nursing and not looking for work in nursing decreased from 12.3% in 1993 to 8.4% in 1994, while the proportion who were employed in nursing increased from 81.4% to 84.7% over the same period.
- Of those registered nurses employed in nursing, excluding those on extended leave, 90.3% were working as clinicians, 4.8% as administrators, 2.5% as teachers or educators, 0.4% as researchers and the remaining 2.0% in other nursing occupations.

Classification

• The distribution of employed registered nurses across classifications was relatively similar for males and females in 1994, although a larger proportion of females were level 1 registered nurses, the lowest classification (63.8% of females compared with 55.3% of males), while a smaller proportion of females were classified as assistant directors or directors of nursing (5.2% of females compared with 8.6% of males).

Main areas of practice

• Of the 155,752 registered nurses employed as clinicians in 1994, one-third were employed in the areas of medical and surgical practice, followed by 14.6% in gerontology or geriatric nursing. The distribution across specific areas of clinical nursing was relatively similar across all States and differed in the Territories where a lower proportion of clinicians were employed in gerontology and geriatric areas and a higher proportion were employed in obstetrics, gynaecology and midwifery (13.3% in the Australian Capital Territory and 13.2% in the Northern Territory compared with the national proportion of 9.0%). Also in the Northern Territory, 15.2% of clinicians were employed in community health compared with the national proportion of 3.7%.

Age

• The average age of employed registered nurses in 1994 was 39.6 years. On average, females were slightly older than males—39.7 years compared with 37.9 years.

Hours worked

• On average, registered nurses worked a total of 32.5 hours per week in 1994. Males worked an average of 39.0 hours per week while females worked 31.9 hours. This difference in average hours worked is a result of the higher proportion of females working part-time hours—49.1% compared with only 13.4% of males. 79.5% of males worked between 35 and 50 hours per week, while 79.2% of females worked between 20 and 50 hours per week.

- While average hours worked by male registered nurses were similar across all States and Territories, average hours worked by females varied from a high of 34.6 hours per week in the Australian Capital Territory to a low of 29.9 hours in Tasmania (which also had the highest proportion of females—59.3%—working part-time).
- Given a higher proportion of males working in psychiatric and mental health, only 21.9% of nurses in this field worked part-time and their average hours worked (37.2 hours per week) were longer than for other areas of nursing practice. Registered nurses working in the area of private medical or independent practice averaged the least hours (24.6 hours per week) because 74.8% worked part-time.

Sector of employment

- 70.4% of registered nurses worked in the public sector in 1994. This proportion varied from highs of 85.6% in the Northern Territory and 78.9% in the Australian Capital Territory to lows of 64.5% in Queensland and 65.7% in South Australia. Of registered nurses employed in the public sector, 70.4% worked in acute and psychiatric hospitals, 8.1% worked in nursing homes and 7.2% worked in community health centres. In the private sector, 45.7% worked in acute and psychiatric hospitals, 24.7% worked in nursing homes and 9.8% worked in private medical rooms.
- Registered nurses employed in the public sector worked an average of 33.8 hours per week compared with 29.3 hours in the private sector. Registered nurses employed in the Northern Territory worked the longest average hours in both the public (37.2 hours per week) and private (32.0 hours) sectors. Average hours worked across both public and private sectors ranged across work setting—from a high of 39.9 hours per week in the defence forces to a low of 24.7 hours in private medical rooms.

Post registration nursing courses

- 51.7% of registered nurses had completed post registration nursing courses. Of these, 76.0% indicated that they had used the special skills of one or more of these qualifications for 12 months or more during the past five years.
- Midwifery was by far the most popular post registration nursing qualification (22,947 nurses) followed by intensive care (6,116) and advanced nursing studies (5,247).




Figure 4: Registered nurses employed as clinicians: percentage distribution by area of clinical nursing, Australia, 1994




Figure 5: Registered nurses working part-time: percentage distribution by sex and States and Territories (excluding the Northern Territory), 1994



7 Enrolled nurses

Overall numbers

- In 1994, 53,601 enrolled nurses were employed in Australia, including 925 nurses on leave for three months or more—a slight increase of 0.7% on the number employed in 1993.
- In the nursing labour force in 1994, 3,865 enrolled nurses (6.7%) were not employed in nursing and were looking for work in nursing.
- Not in the nursing labour force in 1994 were 540 enrolled nurses who were working overseas and a further 5,279 enrolled nurses not employed in nursing and not looking for work in nursing.
- The proportion of enrolled nurses who were not employed in nursing and not looking for work in nursing decreased from 13.4% in 1993 to 8.3% in 1994, while the proportion who were employed in nursing increased from 79.7% to 84.7% over the same period.
- Of those enrolled nurses employed in nursing, excluding those on extended leave, 93.0% were working as clinicians, 0.3% as administrators, 0.8% as teachers or educators and the remaining 5.9% in other nursing occupations.
- There was a much higher employment of enrolled nurses in Victoria than in other States and Territories, primarily because stricter staffing regulations for aged care in Victoria led to greater employment of enrolled nurses—9,465 in gerontology and geriatric care in that State compared with 4,045 in New South Wales and 1,840 in Queensland.

Main area of practice

• Of the 48,997 enrolled nurses employed as clinicians in 1994, 38.1% were employed in the area of gerontology or geriatric nursing and 33.2% were employed in the areas of medical and surgical practice. The distribution across these specific areas of clinical nursing differed across the States and Territories. In Victoria, 53.4% of clinicians were employed in gerontology or geriatric nursing while only 18.2% were employed in medical and surgical practice. In contrast, in the Northern Territory, these proportions were 18.2% and 42.0% respectively.

Age

• The average age of employed enrolled nurses in 1994 was 37.3 years. On average, females were slightly older than males—37.4 years compared with 36.5 years.

Hours worked

- On average, enrolled nurses worked 30.9 hours per week in 1994. Males worked an average of 36.8 hours per week while females worked 30.5 hours. This difference in average hours worked is a result of the higher proportion of females working part-time hours—58.2% compared with only 27.1% of males.
- Average hours worked by enrolled nurses varied across States and Territories from a high of 33.7 hours per week in the Australian Capital Territory to a low of 28.0 hours in South Australia (which also had the highest proportion of enrolled nurses working part-time—65.8%).
- Enrolled nurses employed as clinicians in the area of psychiatric or mental health nursing worked longer hours (36.3 hours per week), on average, than those employed

in other areas and in this area only 27.9% of nurses worked part-time hours. Enrolled nurses working in district or domiciliary nursing worked, on average, the least hours (23.8 hours per week) as 79.5% of these nurses worked part-time.

Sector of employment

- 69.3% of enrolled nurses were employed in the public sector in 1994. This proportion varied from highs of 76.4% in the Australian Capital Territory and 74.0% in the Northern Territory to lows of 63.9% in Tasmania and 64.5% in Queensland. Of enrolled nurses employed in the public sector, 51.4% worked in acute and psychiatric hospitals and a further 28.8% worked in nursing homes. In the private sector, 45.4% worked in nursing homes, 26.1% worked in acute and psychiatric hospitals and 8.3% worked in private medical rooms.
- Enrolled nurses employed in the public sector worked an average of 31.9 hours per week compared with 28.4 hours in the private sector. Enrolled nurses employed in the Australian Capital Territory worked the longest average hours in both the public (35.4 hours per week) and private (30.2 hours) sectors. Average hours worked across both sectors ranged across work setting—from a high of 43.9 hours per week in the prison medical service to a low of 24.0 hours in agencies.





Figure 7: Enrolled nurses employed as clinicians: percentage distribution by area of clinical nursing, Australia, 1994

8 Rural nurse work force

This section presents data on the characteristics of employed registered and enrolled nurses by geographical location using the *Rural and Remote Areas Classification* (RARAC) of the Department of Health and Family Services. The features of the rural nurse work force included:

• Of the 225,110 employed registered and enrolled nurses in 1994, 61.8% worked in a capital city; 9.9% worked in other major urban areas; 25.4% in rural areas; and the remaining 2.9% in remote areas. This was similar to the distribution of the overall population—63.2% living in capital cities; 9.1% in other major urban areas; 24.5% in rural areas and 3.2% in remote areas. Other health professions have relatively very few persons working in remote areas. This means that nurses in remote areas provide a much higher proportion of the health services received by the population than nurses employed in metropolitan centres.

Registered and enrolled nurses

- Enrolled nurses were more likely to work in rural and remote areas than registered nurses. Some 39.2% of enrolled nurses were working in rural and remote areas in 1994 compared with 25.0% of registered nurses. Just over half (51.7%) of enrolled nurses were working in capital cities compared with 64.9% of registered nurses.
- Of all nurses employed in a capital city in 1994, 80.4% were registered nurses and 19.6% were enrolled nurses. The distribution in other rural and remote areas was 63.1% registered nurses and 36.9% enrolled nurses.

Sex

• Female registered and enrolled nurses were more likely to work in rural and remote areas than their male counterparts. In 1994, 25.0% of female registered nurses and 39.7% of female enrolled nurses were working in rural and remote areas compared with 21.4% and 30.2% respectively for males.

Age

• The average age of employed nurses was higher in rural areas than in metropolitan or remote areas. In 1994, in rural areas, 13.6% of employed nurses were aged less than 30 years and 16.2% were aged 50 years and over. In comparison, these proportions were 20.7% and 13.6% respectively in remote areas, and 19.1% and 16.0% respectively in capital cities.

Hours worked

- Average hours worked per week by employed nurses decreased with geographical remoteness from 32.6 hours per week in capital cities to 29.8 hours in other rural areas, although nurses working in remote areas averaged the longest hours (33.2 hours) in 1994. This pattern was evident for both registered and enrolled nurses.
- 40.4% of registered nurses in remote areas worked part-time in 1994 compared with 58.1% of registered nurses in other rural areas. Of enrolled nurses, 52.2% in remote areas were working part-time compared with 62.6% in other rural areas.

Classification

• Registered nurses were more likely to be level 1 registered nurses, the lowest classification, in metropolitan areas than in other rural or remote areas and less likely


to be directors of nursing. In 1994, 63.1% of registered nurses working in capital cities were level 1 registered nurses, while 57.0% were working at this level in remote areas. Some 2.4% of capital city registered nurses were directors of nursing while 4.7% of remote registered nurses were working at this level.

Work setting of main job

- Registered nurses working in remote areas were more likely to be located in a community health centre than were their metropolitan counterparts. In 1994, 14.1% of registered nurses working in remote areas were located in a community health centre compared with 4.2% in capital cities. Also, 7.4% of registered nurses in remote areas were working in nursing homes compared with 13.1% in capital cities.
- 39.9% of enrolled nurses in capital cities were working in acute and psychiatric hospitals and 32.4% in nursing homes, compared with 62.4% and 20.4% respectively of enrolled nurses working in remote areas.

Nurses per 100,000 population

• In 1994, there were 1,262.1 employed nurses per 100,000 population. This varied across geographic locations from a high of 1,702.2 per 100,000 population in major rural areas to a low of 959.6 in other rural areas. In capital cities, the provision was 1,233.9 per 100,000 population. There were more than twice as many enrolled nurses per 100,000 population in major rural areas (488.1) than in capital cities (241.6).

9 Migration and education

Nurse international migration data are provided by the Department of Immigration and Multicultural Affairs. The features of these data include:

- In 1995, 1,176 nurses who were citizens of foreign countries permanently migrated to Australia and a further 1,934 nurses who were Australian citizens or permanent residents of Australia returned after a long-term (12 months or more) overseas stay. During the same year, 605 Australian nurses permanently migrated out of Australia and a further 427 foreign nurses who had been residing in Australia for 12 months or more migrated out of the country.
- Also in 1995, 254 nurses who were citizens of foreign countries arrived in Australia temporarily to take up employment. Of these, 49.2% previously resided in New Zealand and 33.5% resided in the United Kingdom and Ireland. During the same year, 1,231 Australian citizen or permanent resident nurses left Australia temporarily to take up employment overseas. Of these, 29.2% were intending to work in the Middle East, 23.3% in the United Kingdom and Ireland and 14.4% in Hong Kong.
- 272 nurses arrived in Australia temporarily for education purposes during 1995. 73.2% of these nurses previously resided in Asia, of whom 26.1% were from Singapore. Some 58 Australians left the country temporarily to study overseas, mainly in the United Kingdom and Ireland.

The Australian Nursing Council is responsible for assessing, for migration purposes, the qualifications of nurses educated overseas. In 1995, 363 of the 385 overseas-educated nurse applicants were assessed as eligible to practise nursing in Australia. Of the successful applicants, 87.6% were from the United Kingdom and Ireland. This proportion had increased from 73.8% in 1993.

The unsuccessful applicants were advised that either they would need to undertake a migrant bridging program or they did not meet the requirements for registration because:

- the length of time since the applicant last practised nursing was more than five years;
- there is no register existing in Australia for the particular qualification held; or
- the applicant was not a registered nurse in the country of origin.

Data on the number of students who enrolled in or completed courses in nursing were obtained from the Department of Employment, Education, Training and Youth Affairs. The features of these data include:

- In 1995, 33,416 students were enrolled in nursing courses—23,207 (69.4%) students in basic nursing and 10,209 (30.6%) students in post-basic nursing courses. After reaching a peak of 35,692 in 1993, the number of students enrolled in nursing courses decreased by 6.4% to 33,416 students in 1995. Females accounted for 87.7% of all students (86.3% of basic nursing and 90.9% of post-basic nursing students). This proportion has remained relatively steady since 1989.
- The pattern of enrolments has changed over the past several years. In 1989, most basic nursing students (98.0%) were enrolled in a diploma course while in 1995 most (99.7%) were enrolled in a bachelor course. This changeover most noticeably occurred in 1992. While most post-basic nursing students are enrolled in bachelor courses, this proportion decreased from 74.7% in 1989 to 55.5% in 1995, and the proportion enrolled in doctoral, masters or postgraduate diploma courses has increased from 6.4% to 39.4% over the same period.

- 14,604 students commenced nursing courses in 1995—43.7% of enrolments. Of these, 8,636 (59.1%) commenced basic nursing and 5,968 (40.9%) commenced post-basic nursing courses. As with enrolments, the number of commencements also decreased in 1994—down to 14,010 students—but increased again in 1995 to its highest level. Females accounted for 87.3% of all commencements (85.2% of basic nursing and 90.3% of post-basic nursing students).
- In 1994, 11,581 students completed nursing courses at Australian universities—7,279 (62.9%) completed basic nursing and 4,302 (37.1%) completed post-basic nursing courses. After increasing by an average of 24.4% per year between 1989 and 1993, during the change over from hospital-based to university nursing education, the number of completions increased by only 3.1% between 1993 and 1994. Females accounted for 89.4% of all completions in 1994.
- Of the 10,765 Australian permanent resident students who completed nursing courses in 1994, 81.5% were born in Australia, 14.2% were born overseas, and the remaining 4.3% were unable to be classified. Of the 1,531 students born overseas, 40.5% were from the United Kingdom and Ireland and 25.7% were from Asian countries.



Clinician

A registered or enrolled nurse who is mainly involved in the care and treatment of patients, including nursing diagnosis and preventative action.

Country

The Australian Bureau of Statistics, Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics, Catalogue No. 1269.0 has been used to classify data by country.

Enrolled nurse

A nurse who is on the roll maintained by the State or Territory nurses board or nursing council to practise nursing in that State or Territory. The minimum educational requirement for an enrolled nurse is a one year diploma from a tertiary education institution or equivalent from a recognised hospital-based program. It is necessary for a nurse to have practised for a specified minimum period in the past five years to maintain enrolment. Enrolled nurses include mothercraft, mental health, psychiatric and dental nurses where the educational course requirements may be greater than one year but less than a three year degree course or equivalent.

Geographic classification

The Rural and Remote Areas Classification (RARAC), January 1994, of the Department of Health and Family Services has been used to classify the geographic location of the main job of responding nurses in the following five categories:

- 1. capital city;
- 2. other major urban: areas with a population of 80,000 or more—for example, are Newcastle, Wollongong, Queanbeyan (part of Canberra–Queanbeyan), Geelong, Gold Coast–Tweed (part), Townsville, Cairns, Sunshine Coast, Toowoomba and Launceston;
- 3. major rural:
 - statistical local areas with a minimum population of 20,000 in New South Wales and Victoria, 18,000 in Queensland, or 14,000 in other States and Territories; or
 - urban areas with a population density of 30 or more per square kilometre and a population of at least 10,000 in New South Wales and Victoria, 9,000 in Queensland, or 7,000 in other States/Territories.
 - For example, Albury, Armidale, Lismore (NSW); Ballarat, Shepparton (Vic); Gladstone, Mackay (Qld); Mount Gambier, Port Augusta (SA); Albany, Bunbury (WA); and Devonport, Wynyard (Tas);
- 4. *other rural:* for example, Cowra Shire, Temora Shire (NSW); Ararat Shire, Cobram Shire (Vic); Cardwell Shire, Whitsunday Shire (Qld); Barossa, Pinnaroo (SA); Moora Shire, York Shire (WA); Bruny, Ross (Tas); and Vernon (NT);
- 5. remote: generally less densely populated areas than rural statistical local areas and hundreds of kilometres from a major urban centre—for example, are Broken Hill, Bourke (NSW); Mildura, Omeo (Vic); Mt Isa, Quilpie (Qld); Port Lincoln, Coober Pedy (SA); Carnarvon, Exmouth (WA); King Island, Zeehan (Tas); and Alice Springs, Jabiru (NT).

Hours worked

The total number of hours worked per week self reported by responding nurses as the average worked in all nursing related jobs over the four weeks before the survey. Note that some States and Territories recorded hours worked in the respondent's first and second nursing related jobs while other States and Territories recorded hours worked in the respondent's first, second and remaining nursing related jobs.

Hours worked exclude time spent on travel between work locations (except travel to callouts) and unpaid professional and/or voluntary activities. In the editing of survey responses, maximum hours worked per week was limited to 126 hours per week.

The cut-off for full-time and part-time work varies among the States and Territories. In this publication the Australian Bureau of Statistics definition has been used:

- *full-time*: 35 hours or more per week;
- part-time: less than 35 hours per week.

Nursing labour force

The nursing labour force (registered and enrolled nurses) in each State and Territory includes nurses currently employed in nursing and nurses who are not employed in nursing but are looking for work in nursing.

Registered and enrolled nurses who, at the time of the survey, were on maternity or other extended leave for more than 3 months are employed, and thus part of the nursing labour force. However, in most cross-classified tables for employed nurses, those on extended leave have not been included because data were not collected on their employment characteristics prior to commencement of leave.

Occupation

A description of the job function within the field of nursing of a person with nursing qualifications. The occupations are:

- *clinician*: a registered or enrolled nurse who is mainly involved in the care and treatment of patients, including nursing diagnosis and preventative action;
- administrator: a person mainly employed in nursing administration;
- *teacher/educator:* a person who is teaching or training persons in nursing for their initial qualification or in advanced skills after initial qualification;
- researcher: a person engaged in research in the practice of nursing; and
- *other*: a job function in nursing which is not one of the above—for example, industrial relations or public health activities in nursing.

Registered nurse

A nurse who is on the register maintained by the State or Territory nurses board or nursing council to practise nursing in that State or Territory. The minimum educational requirement for a registered nurse is a three year degree from a tertiary education institution or equivalent from a recognised hospital-based program. Registered nurses may have their practice certificate endorsed to practise in a specific clinical area (for example, midwifery) on completion of a recognised postgraduate course. To maintain registration, it is necessary for a nurse to have practised for a specified minimum period in the field of nursing in the past five years.

Work setting

The functional use of the premises where a nursing job is located. The table below presents the concordance between the description in the publication and the data as collected from each State and Territory.
