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Disability support services

Revisions to CSDA MDS data and reports 1996 to 2000

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1 Introduction

Each year since 1995 the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare has published a report on disability support services in Australia based on the Commonwealth/State Disability Agreement Minimum Data Set (CSDA MDS). Since the publication of reports for each of the years 1996 to 2000 (Black et al. 1998, Black and Maples 1998, AIHW 1999, AIHW 2000, AIHW 2001), there have been some important updates and other minor revisions to the final datasets for each year. These final revised data sets are used for all analyses of trends in publications from the time of the 2001 report (AIHW 2002). The present report outlines all revisions and includes tables where there have been substantial changes and lists those where there are minor changes. Revised tables are numbered as they were in the corresponding original report.

2 Reasons for data revisions

Changes to service type for NSW (1999 and 2000)

Corrections have been made by one jurisdiction (NSW) to the *service type* of six service outlets for 1999 and 2000. The *service type* of these outlets changed from 'institutional accommodation/large residential' to either 'resource teams/regional teams' (community support), or to 'continuing education/independent living training/adult training centre' (community access). These changes affect 361 consumers in 1999 and 320 consumers in 2000.

The methods for resolving discrepancies between records for the same consumer (as indicated by the statistical linkage key) for some items depend on *service type* (see Appendix 6 of the 1999 report and Appendix 4 of the 2000 report, AIHW 2000 and 2001). This means that the values of some variables other than *service type* may also change for these consumers. As a result, there are numerous changes to the ten items involving need for support or assistance (and thus also *activities of daily living*) and minor changes to *primary disability* and *living arrangements*.

Consistency of linkage procedures for 1999 to other years

In 1999 for the first time the statistical linkage key was collected routinely in all jurisdictions (except Western Australia). At this time there was a period of development of the procedures for the processing of the linkage key to produce tables relating to individual consumers (i.e. with double counting removed). There were some further refinements in these procedures after the publication of the 1999 report, and to be consistent with following years identical procedures have now been applied to the 1999 data. These refinements affect those items for which there are specific logic checks between variables, that is, *method of communication*, *support for communication*, *income*, *primary disability* (for some cases where it was previously developmental delay) *other disability present* and *developmental disability* as other disability.

Services received

All tables in the 1999 report were produced in two forms; one based on consumers and one based on services received. (See Chapter 2 of the 1999 report (AIHW 2000) for further explanation.) The services received tables were constructed from the data as collected, to provide a comparison with previous years. However, the collection of the statistical linkage key enables such tables to be produced after processing of the linkage key, so that they are consistent with the analyses underlying the consumer tables and do not include any duplicate records. (There were 234 duplicate services received records in 1999, which are deleted in the linkage key processing.)

Service type and auspice, 1996 to 1998

For 1997 and 1998, due to improved procedures for matching service recipients with service outlets, it has been possible to assign *service type* and/or *auspice* for a small number of recipients, where previously one or both of these were missing (23 recipients in 1997 and 28 recipients 1998). There have also been a small number of changes to *service type* for 1996 (4 recipients) and 1997 (25 recipients).

Age in 1998

In 1998 it has been possible to calculate *age* from date of birth for some service recipients where previously it was missing. Some other recipients had *age* incorrectly assigned, in most cases where it should have been missing. These changes occurred in a total of 438 cases.

Other revisions

- In 1998, for some Commonwealth service recipients the State/Territory of location of service was incorrectly recorded as ACT instead of Victoria, or Tasmania instead of the Northern Territory.
- In 2000 there are some changes to *other disability present* to ensure that this item is consistent with 2001 and comparable with the revised form of the disability items for 2002 onwards.
- Very minor revisions have been made for *age* in 1997, 1999 and 2000 affecting 20, 11 and 6 cases respectively. These ensure consistency across years in the precision of the calculation of age in years, and the treatment of missing values for this item.
- For 1997 and 1998 there was an error in the algorithm that classified service outlets according to postcode as rural and remote.

Note on consistency checks, 1996 to 1998

It should also be noted that to make all current analyses consistent with later years, two types of consistency checks are applied to the data for 1996 to 1998 where this was not previously done. These affect *support for communication* (and thus *activities of daily living*), *method of communication* and *income* (involves some cases being set to missing) and the disability items (*primary disability, other disability present*, other disabilities and *number of disabilities*).

3 Revisions to 2000 data and report

- All service outlet tables including *service type* and all consumer tables (except Appendix Table A2.1) including *service type*, *other disability present* and/or one of the ten *frequency of support needed* items are revised below. There are 13 such tables (Tables 1.1, 3.2, 3.3, 3.5, 3.12, 3.14, 3.15, 3.19, 3.22, 3.23, 5.1, 5.2 and 5.4). Tables are numbered as they were in the original report (AIHW 2001).
- All tables in Chapter 4, which analyses multiple service use by consumers, are affected by the corrections to service type. Tables 4.1 and 4.2 which summarise multiple service use are revised below; but readers interested in this type of analysis should also refer to the corresponding chapter (also Chapter 4) of the 2001 report (AIHW 2002), as the results for the years 2000 and 2001 are similar. The 2001 report also examines the use of services by consumers across the years 1999 to 2001.
- A number of other tables, not included here, have some insubstantial changes due to minor revisions to *primary disability* (5 cases), *living arrangements* (2 cases) and *age* (11 cases). However, note that of the tables revised below *primary disability* occurs in Tables 3.2 and 3.3 and *age group* in Table 3.2.

4 Revisions to 1999 data and report

- Tables from the 1999 report (AIHW 2000) revised below include 22 from the body of the report (Table 1.1, 3.1 to 3.4, 3.9 to 3.19, 4.1, 4.2, 5.1, 5.2, 5.5, 5.6) and 15 appendix tables (A3.22 to A3.26, A5.1 and A5.4 to A5.12.). Tables are numbered as they were in the original report.
- All service outlet tables including *service type* and all consumer tables including *service type*, *other disability present*, *number of disabilities*, *method of communication*, *income*, *living arrangements* and/or one of the ten *frequency of support needed* items have been revised below.
- *Primary disability* has been revised so that those consumers with primary disability inappropriately recorded as developmental disability have had their primary disability reassigned (mostly as 'not known'). There were also minor revisions to *age group*. Table 3.1 shows the number of consumers by sex, primary disability and age group and other tables with *primary disability* or *age* are included in the list above. However, not all revised tables with *primary disability* and/or *age* are reproduced below (Tables 3.5 to 3.7).
- Tables 3.18 to 3.24, which analyse multiple service use by consumers, are affected by the corrections to *service type*. Tables 3.18 and 3.19 are revised below, but readers interested in this type of analysis should refer to the corresponding tables in Chapter 4 of the 2001 report (AIHW 2002), as the results for the years 1999, 2000 and 2001 are similar. The 2001 report also examines the use of services by consumers across the years 1999 to 2001.
- Table 4.1 shows the number of services received by *service type* and *State/Territory* but other services received tables are not updated here (see section on 1999 services received, page 2).
