




Specialist homelessness services 2015–16: Victoria

Quick facts for Victoria in 2015–16

- 105,287 clients** were assisted, representing 38% of the national Specialist homelessness services (SHS) population (279,196 total clients).
- 38% were homeless** on presentation to a SHS agency, lower than the national rate (44%).
- 205,478 support periods** were provided; an average of 2.0 per client, higher than the national average (1.7).
- About 1 in 4 clients (23%)** received some form of accommodation; half received fewer than 28 nights of accommodation.
- The **top 3 reasons for clients seeking assistance** were: domestic and family violence (42%, compared with 35% nationally); financial difficulties (39%, compared with 38% nationally); and housing crisis (39%, compared with 43% nationally).
- 65% of clients ended support** in private or social housing, the same as in 2014–15 (65%).
- An average of **100 requests for assistance went unmet each day**.

Victorian clients, 2015–16

- The average annual rate of change over the past 5 years in Victoria was an increase of 4.1%.
- 1 in 56 people in Victoria received homelessness assistance, higher than the national rate (1 in 85).
- The number of new clients has been gradually decreasing over the past 4 years, with the number of returning clients gradually increasing.

Clients' needs for assistance and services provided

- A smaller percentage of Victorian clients needed accommodation compared with the national SHS population (44% and 56%, respectively).




Figure 2: Clients, by most needed accommodation type and service provision status, Victoria, 2015–16

Housing outcomes

- Of the clients whose support ended in 2015–16, 1 in 3 (32%) were homeless at the end of that support, down from 38% at commencement.
- While there were reductions across 2 of the 3 homeless categories, the proportion of clients in short-term temporary accommodation increased 2 percentage points to 15% at the end of support. Couch surfing reduced 5 percentage points to 10% at the end of support.




Figure 3: Clients, by housing situation at beginning of support and end of support, Victoria, 2015–16

Client groups of interest in Victoria

- 1 in 130 people in Victoria received homelessness services due to domestic and family violence; this is higher than the national rate (1 in 225).
- People in Victoria with disability accounted for around 1 in 1,639 people who received homelessness assistance in this state; this is higher than the national rate (1 in 2,439).
- Around 1 in 219 people in Victoria who received homelessness assistance had experienced mental health issues; this is higher than the national rate (1 in 329).
